
Galesburg Public Library Book Club Kits

In the Heart of the Sea by Nathaniel Philbrick. The true story that inspired Herman Melville's *Moby-Dick*. Related DVD: *In the Heart of the Sea*.



The Light Between Oceans by M.L. Stedman. An Australian lighthouse keeper and his wife find a boat bearing a dead man and a living baby and decide to keep the baby despite the husband's misgivings. Related DVD: *The Light Between Oceans*.



Little Heathens by Mildred Armstrong Kalish. One woman's memories of growing up in Iowa during the Great Depression. Related DVD: The People in the Pictures: Stories from the Wettach Farm Photos.



Lone Wolf by **Jodi Picoult.** A novel that looks at the intersection between medical science and moral choices, as siblings disagree over whether to keep their comatose father on life support.



A Long Way from Chicago by Richard Peck. Warm, humorous fiction about two young siblings from Chicago spending summers from 1929-1942 with their unforgettable grandmother in central Illinois.



Major Pettigrew's Last Stand by Helen Simonson. Major Ernest Pettigrew, honor-bound Englishman and widower, falls for Mrs. Jasmina Ali, the Pakistani shopkeeper in their village.

The Maltese Falcon by Dashiell Hammett. A treasure worth killing for. Sam Spade, a private eye with his own solitary code of ethics. Brigid O'Shaughnessy, a beautiful and treacherous woman whose loyalties shift at the drop of a dime. These are the ingredients of this coolly glittering gem of detective fiction, a novel that has haunted three generations of readers. Related DVD: *The Maltese Falcon*.

→*New* *Milk and Honey* by Rupi Kaur. This is a collection of poetry and prose about survival. About the experience of violence, abuse, love, loss, and femininity. It takes readers through a journey of the most bitter moments in life and finds sweetness in them because there is sweetness everywhere if you are just willing to look.

Reservation Blues by Sherman Alexie. Fiction about a bluesman's gift of a guitar to a Native American on a reservation. Related DVD: *Chiefs*.






Twelve Years a Slave by Solomon Northup. Memoir of a black man who was born free in New York State but was kidnapped, sold into slavery and kept in bondage for 12 years in Louisiana. Related DVD: *Twelve Years a Slave*.

Unbroken by Laura Hillenbrand. In boyhood, Louis Zamperini was a delinquent. As a teenager, he channeled his defiance into running, discovering a talent that carried him to the Berlin Olympics. But when World War II began, the athlete became an airman, embarking on a journey that led to a doomed flight and life as a Japanese POW. An unforgettable testament to the resilience of the human mind, body, and spirit. Related DVD: *Unbroken*.
