The Hate U Give By Angie Thomas YA THOMAS

Starr witnesses the fatal shooting of her friend Khalil by police at a traffic stop, and soon the case makes national headlines. As some people protest Khalil's murder and others defend or excuse the officers, Starr must decide whether to speak up, possibly at the risk of her own life.

On the Come Up By Angie Thomas YA THOMAS

Bri wants to be a rapper more than anything. She pours her anger and pain into her 1st song, which goes viral for all the wrong reasons. Painted as a menace by the media, Bri must decide whether to let that define her or work to change the image she helped create.

Black Boy/White School By Brian Walker YA WALKER

Marvin's world is turned upside down when his twin brother, Tyler, is killed by a white police officer. As his mother falls apart and his brother is now a hashtag, Marvin must come to grips with what justice and freedom really mean. Inspired by events from the author's childhood.

Fire from the Rock By Sharon Draper YA DRAPER

In 1957, Sylvia Patterson's life--that of a normal African American teenager--is disrupted by the impending integration of Little Rock's Central High when she is selected to be one of the first black students to attend the previously all white school. Includes author's note and related websites.

I'm Not Dying with You Tonight By Kimberly Jones and Gilly Segal YA JONES

Two girls—one black, one white—are thrown together when the football game they attend explodes into a race riot. They aren't friends and barely know each other, but Lena and Campbell must rely on each other to get through.

How it Went Down By Kekla Magoon YA MAGOON

When 16-year-old Tariq Johnson is shot to death, his community is thrown into an uproar because Tariq was black and the shooter, Jack Franklin, is white. In the aftermath everyone has something to say, but no two accounts of the events agree.

Monster By Walter Dean Myers GRAPHIC MYERS

While on trial as an accomplice to a murder, 16-yearold Steve Harmon records his experiences in prison and in the courtroom in the form of a film script as he tries to come to terms with the course his life has taken.

After attending a powerful protest, 12 year-old Shayla starts wearing an armband to school to support the Black Lives Matter movement. But when the school gives her an ultimatum, she is forced to choose between her education and her identity.

When sixteen-year-old Rashad is mistakenly accused of stealing, classmate Quinn witnesses his brutal beating at the hands of a police officer who happens to be the older brother of his best friend. Told through Rashad and Quinn's alternating viewpoints.

Long Way Down By Jason Reynolds YA REYNOLDS

Will's brother Shawn was just murdered, so he's taken Shawn's gun to go after his killer. As he rides the elevator down, Will is joined by people who knew his brother—some of them dead— while he thinks about whether to go through with it. Told in verse, the whole novel takes place in 60 seconds.

Black Brother, Black Brother By Jewell Parker Rhodes JFIC RHODES

Suspended unjustly from the elite prep school where he's one of the only black boys, Donte studies fencing with a former champion, hoping to put the racist fencing team captain in his place.
