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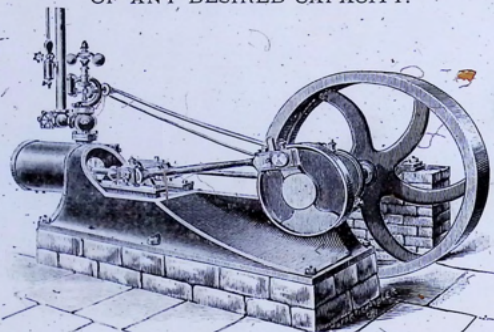
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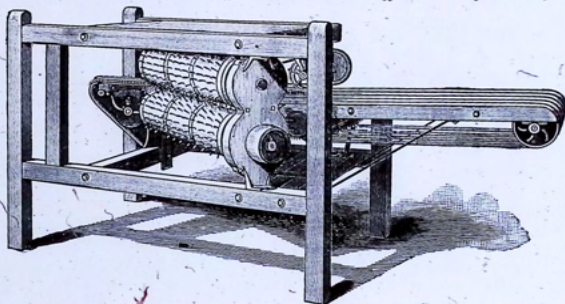

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THE CITY OF GALESBURG.

A BRIEF SKETCH OF ITS HISTORY.

In the necessarily restricted space which can be allotted for the purpose in a work of this character, only a brief synopsis of the present condition of our city, and a hasty backward glance at its earlier history, can be attempted; and, although it would require a volume, rather than a few pages, to do justice to the subject, yet it will not, we trust, be altogether devoid of interest.

It is not without justice that Galesburg lays claim to and takes pride in the title of THE COLLEGE CITY. She is the offspring, the sole and peculiar child of the College, and owes her distinctive existence first as a village to the sagacity of the founders of Knox College, whose plan, for the better endowing of the projected enterprise, included the purchase of a large tract of land, and the laying out of a village upon a portion of the same.

Prior to 1835, a map of Illinois, if such things were in those days, might have been scanned in vain for any trace of the city which is now our pride and boast. Galesburg was then but a child of the imagination—a thing of nothing—waiting to be ushered into being and given a local habitation and a name. In the Fall of 1835, a Purchasing Committee, sent out from the East for the purpose, selected and entered a large tract of land, located a town site and called the town Galesburg, in honor of the Rev. George W. Gale, who had been the leading spirit in the movement, and was deservedly honored by his companions in this selection.

In the Spring of 1836 a few pioneer families settled in and near the new village, and Galesburg became a fixed fact—not a very formidable one, to be sure, but with Christian education as the central idea of her existence—her reason for being, indeed—and all the possibilities for a glorious future which such a beginning promised.

The little handful of settlers struggled on, 232 souls, all told, great and little—rarely discouraged, generally hopeful, perfected their plans for the College and Seminary, lived largely on faith, with hog and hominy for the substantial, and gradually increased in number by accessions from without and natural increase, until in 1846, just a decade from the founding of the village, there is a population of about 800, with over seventy dwelling-houses,

several "country stores," shops, mills, and so on; an ample church building—the First Church—in process of erection, and College buildings worth nearly \$10,000, completed, and the College in successful operation.

The moral tone of the town was most excellent, and in a comparison of *then* with *now* in this regard, one might be pardoned a blush for these degenerate times and a natural sigh for those halcyon days before the shriek of the locomotive had been heard or the evils incident to larger growth had taken root in this simple society. Nearly all in the community were professing Christians. Sabbath desecration was unknown; profanity was rarely heard and severely dealt with. The sale and use of intoxicating drinks were alike unknown. The interests of college and town were identical, and so closely intertwined that a line of separation could hardly be drawn.

The opening of railroad communication with Chicago in 1854 gave a great impetus to the growth of the city, and in 1856—twenty years from the founding—we find a population of 4,000, enterprising, energetic and aggressive, proud of its past but with an eye to the future, and a diversity of interests, commercial, manufacturing and agricultural, replacing and in a measure displacing the old predominant one. As an instance of the disfavor created by the startling innovations introduced by the advent of the railway and of the autocratic sway of the old regime, it is related that the venerable head of the college at that time, who united in his person the offices of minister and President, was scandalized one Sabbath by unmistakable evidences of an intention to violate the holy day by setting a train in motion. Naturally impetuous and imperious, he took in the situation at a glance, and without a moment's hesitation planted himself on the track in front of the slow-moving train and commanded a halt. As well might Dame Partington attempt to sweep back the rising tide of Ocean or King Canute by royal mandate stay its farther advance. The bell rang; the whistle shrieked "Get out!" and the discomfited Dominie was fain to retire from the unequal conflict, realizing sadly enough, no doubt, that a new era, if not a better one, had dawned.

In the year 1857, just twenty-one years from its first settlement, a city charter was obtained, and Galesburg took her place among the sisterhood of cities; Hon. Henry R. Sanderson having the honor of first filling the Mayor's chair, ably seconded by an aldermanic board made up from the best citizens. The growth of the city from this time has been steady and healthful, although not rapid. Like many other of the older cities, Galesburg has contributed largely of her children and wealth to the settlement and upbuilding of the far-Western country, and this constant drain has operated to retard, while it has not wholly checked her own growth. In 1850 the population was about 4,000. In 1866 it had reached to nearly 8,000. The census of 1870 placed the figure at 10,158, and that of 1880 at 11,446. The best data attainable warrant us in placing the present population of the city at 13,000 in round numbers. While it is true that many new Western cities, scarcely in their teens, can boast a larger population, we may safely challenge any city, East or West, to a comparison in other respects. A glance at the map accompanying this work will show the marvelous extent of territory comprised within our boundaries. Here, of a truth, every man's house is his castle, and has a

goodly slice of God's green earth before the door. It is estimated, with every probability that the figure falls short of the actual number, that there are over 2,000 dwellings, of all sorts and sizes, within the city limits. This fact of itself speaks volumes for the general thrift and forehandedness of our laboring population, and augurs well for the prosperity of the city. There has been a large addition to this number during the past year, the tendency being toward more neat and tasty construction, giving evidence of the gradual emancipation of the public mind from set forms and dogmas, whether in buildings or creeds. There is one compensation for the lack of parks, that at all events, there is no lack of fresh air or room to breathe it. The streets of the city are well-lighted with gas, supplemented where the gas mains do not reach by gasoline lamps. Great improvements have been made of late years in the grading and curbing of the streets, the sewage system is being constantly extended, in harmony with a well-defined plan, which, when fully developed, aims at utilizing Cedar Fork as an essential factor in the solution of the vexed question, What can be done with a stream too large for a gutter, but too small for anything else.

It would appear to be now a settled policy on the part of the city to make a certain limited extent of street improvement of a permanent, substantial character each year, gradually extending the area of improvement until all the principal thoroughfares are put in good order. A stimulus has also been given to the building of substantial foot-walks by the offer of the city to bear one-half the cost of a walk made of brick or concrete, and the unsightly and dangerous wooden traps for the feet of unwary pedestrians are fast being replaced by more lasting material.

A great lack of the city in years past has been the want of an adequate supply of water for fire purposes and domestic use. To supply this want, Nathan Shelton, Esq., of Freeport, Ill., organized a company, secured a valuable franchise from the city, and immediately set to work laying pipes, erecting buildings, sinking wells, etc., and in the Summer of 1884 declared the works ready for business. The supply of water, however, soon proved inadequate, and of poor quality, creating general dissatisfaction. The gang-well system proved essentially a failure, and suspicion as to the true source of supply could not be set at rest by anything short of actual demonstration. Recognizing this necessity, the Water Company has been reorganized and a Board of Directors consisting of well-known citizens placed in control. Arrangements are being made to connect with a series of fresh-water ponds east of the city, thereby securing an ample supply of wholesome water. All will rejoice at the success of the proposed extension, if it succeeds, and it is to be hoped that no unforeseen hindrance may prevent its speedy completion.

The best evidence of the healthfulness of the city is found in the exceptionally low rate of mortality; the death-rate for 1884 being a little short of twelve to the thousand of population. Its healthful moral tone is equally marked. The total number of arrests made in 1884 was 423, much the greater part being of the "plain drunk" variety. To keep the peace, a Marshal and six policemen suffice, nor are their labors arduous.

In the line of building and public improvements, the city has in the past

two years made wonderful strides. The Water Works System will, when completed as now proposed, be of incalculable benefit as a protection against fire. The New Depot is a magnificent building, with every convenience for the proper transaction of the immense business of the company and for the accommodation of the traveling public. The New Court House, an edifice of noble proportions, which will be, when completed, an honor to the city and county, is at the present writing just beginning to show itself above ground. The church erected by the Catholic Society, on the corner of Prairie and South streets, is nearly finished, and challenges admiration for the beauty of its architecture and the stately symmetry of its proportions. The work of track-laying for the Street Railway is being pushed rapidly forward, and the citizens of Galesburg will have the pleasure ere many weeks of beholding the novel sight of a *bona fide* Street Railway in actual operation. It would be useless to attempt to enumerate a tithe of the improvements of a less public character. A drive through our beautifully shaded streets reveals scores of new and handsome residences that have sprung up as if by magic, while older and plainer buildings strive by aid of paint to vie with the fresh bloom of their younger rivals. On every side one beholds evidences of prosperity and progress, and he must be a croaker indeed who fails to perceive and rejoice in the fact.

The business interests of the city are in a no less satisfactory condition. As a class, our business men are energetic, enterprising, and above all, trustworthy. For this reason, the financial stringency which, for several years, has been gradually drawing tighter, and forcing weak and unsound enterprises to the wall, has worked little harm here. Our solid business men are seasoned to all weather, and when the storms break and the business sky is overcast, can afford to wait for the sunshine sure to follow. The business blocks, nearly without exception, have been remodeled, modernized and vastly improved by substitution of plate glass fronts for the old contracted windows formerly in vogue. Every inducement is displayed in the attractive windows to tempt the eye, and the extensive and elegant stocks in all departments of trade leave nothing to be desired in rich variety of choice. Several new blocks for business purposes are projected and will, doubtless soon take form; among others, a new post-office building to be put up by Robert Chappell, Esq., adjoining his business block on the corner of Main and Kellogg Streets. The building is to be fitted and furnished in accordance with plans and specifications furnished by the Post Office Department.

Enough has been adduced to verify the statement that our city is neither dead nor sleeping, but moving along at a good pace in the march of progress. Our moneyed citizens at length seem to fully realize that it is the part of wisdom to invest their money in home enterprises, and so assist in the further up-building of the city and reap the benefit of enhanced values.

EDUCATIONAL.

It is a fact beyond dispute that it is to her educational advantages that Galesburg owes her honorable position, and through her schools and colleges is known far and wide. Any sketch of our city, her institutions, and advantages, however brief, that neglected to give prominence to this fact and

honorable mention of this prime factor in our prosperity, would fail of its object. At the head of the list, by virtue of seniority and importance, stands

KNOX COLLEGE.

This institution, as has been elsewhere stated, was founded in 1837 by a company of earnest Christians whose object was to afford the opportunity of acquiring a higher education, upon a thoroughly Christian basis, to the youth of what was then, a thinly settled territory, destitute or nearly so of all but the rudest and most imperfect means to that end. It was fully organized as a College in 1841, and graduated its first class, consisting of nine young men, four years later. Despite occasional reverses by fire, by financial depression, by internal dissensions, the last most nearly fatal of all, the tide of prosperity, though sometimes stayed, has never ebbed, and Old Knox, as her children love to style their *Alma Mater*, to-day occupies a proud rank among the foremost colleges of the land. During the last decade, and, in particular, the latter years, the College has prospered beyond all precedent, the attendance in all departments showing a constant increase. The harmony and cordial co-operation subsisting between the Board of Trust and the Faculty has infused the same spirit into the students, and each does his part gladly for the common interest of all. The year 1884-5 will ever be a red-letter day in the history of the College, and is a just cause of congratulation to the honored President, Dr. Newton Bateman, to whose untiring zeal and signal ability much of the credit is justly due; and no less worthy of commendation is the able Faculty of Instructors, each of whom, in his department, and all in corporate action, have ably seconded and sustained him. A large addition to the endowment fund of the College was made by the will of the late Henry Hitchcock, by which property and moneys aggregating nearly \$70,000 was bequeathed for the founding of a professorship. The victory of Mr. Chas. T. Wyckoff, the contestant on the part of Knox in the Inter-State Oratorical Contest, followed close upon the heels of this and added to the rejoicing. At the commencement in June 1884 a class of thirty-four was graduated, and the meetings of the Alumni and Alumnae had all the fervor and enthusiasm of a genuine love-feast. In the latter part of 1884 Dr. Bateman's persevering efforts to secure the detailing of a United States Army Officer as Professor of Military Science and Tactics in Knox College were at length successful, and Lieut. Stephen C. Mills was assigned to that duty. The students have entered into the scheme with abundant zeal, and in the few weeks that have elapsed since organization, have made creditable progress. Much benefit is expected from the drill and discipline connected with this added branch of study. It is optional with the student to take this course, but, once taken, he must persevere in it.

The College has a full staff of Professors and Instructors, and instruction in the full collegiate course is thorough and complete; the aim and intention being to maintain a high standard of classical and scientific culture. For such as desire it, a shorter course, designated as Scientific, and excluding the ancient languages, is provided. The attendance during the current year numbered 459. The graduating class numbers 41, being the largest ever graduated from Knox.

KNOX SEMINARY.

Knox Seminary is designed to furnish a liberal course of instruction to young ladies. The course of study occupies four years, and offers every facility for thorough mental discipline and liberal culture; the College Courses, both Classical and Scientific, are open to young ladies. The studies of the regular Seminary Course are under the charge of the President and Professors of the College, and the young ladies have the benefit of their instruction and lectures, and enjoy exactly the same advantages in the use of the Library, Apparatus and Cabinets of the College as are provided for the young men. It is easily perceived that such advantages are not attainable at Seminaries unconnected with a College, and under the supervision of its Faculty. An addition to the Seminary building is in course of erection, which will furnish additional accommodations for boarders, a Society hall and other purposes.

KNOX ACADEMY.

Knox Academy is an adjunct to the College, and comprises two departments, English and Classical. The former provides a full course of English studies and the latter is designed to fit students of both sexes for the College and Seminary Courses.

LOMBARD UNIVERSITY.

Lombard University was chartered in 1857, and opened its halls for instruction in 1852. It is under the control of the Universalist denomination and is avowedly non-sectarian in its ends and teachings. It seeks its support from among those who believe that the best training of the intellect and heart can be secured by leaving the minds of the pupils unfettered by sectarian dogmas, and undisturbed by wrangling of creeds. The purpose of this institution is to provide for students of either sex equal opportunity for thorough courses of instruction, adapted to the varying circumstances or needs of the student. To this end the studies have been arranged to provide a full Collegiate Course covering a period of four years, for such as desire to secure a thorough Classical education; for those whose tastes or necessities demand a more strictly practical education a Scientific Course is provided, of the same length, and intended to combine practical knowledge with intellectual culture and discipline. There is also provided a Literary Course, which occupies the same length of time, and is a composite Course, partaking in part of the features of the others, but more largely devoted to Belles Lettres than either. In the Preparatory Department, students designing to enter the Collegiate Departments pursue a course of studies arranged with that view, while those desiring to qualify themselves for teaching or business life may receive instruction in the higher English branches.

The financial condition of the University has of late years been materially improved, mainly through the unceasing efforts of the able Financial Agent, Rev. E. L. Conger. This gentleman has succeeded in inspiring with something of his own zeal the friends of liberal education, and as a result, in cash and pledges, the sum of over \$60,000 has been added to the College funds, and there is every promise of still greater increase in the future. The Uni-

versity buildings and premises have been put in thorough repair, constant additions are being made to the College Cabinets, Chemical Apparatus and Libraries and an extensive Boarding Hall, where the students may be provided for at the minimum of cost, is in successful operation. Altogether, the prospects of Lombard were never so bright as now, and there is every promise of greatly increased prosperity for the future.

The Faculty is composed of gentlemen of high character and scholarly attainments, ably sustaining the chief executive, President Nehemiah White, an experienced educator, and by nature and experience eminently qualified for the position he so satisfactorily fills.

ST. JOSEPH'S ACADEMY.

St. Joseph's Academy is a Catholic educational institution, under the immediate charge and supervision of the Sisters of Providence, Mother M. Ephrem being Superior. The school is comparatively in its infancy, having been erected in 1870, but has made excellent progress, and offers educational advantages of a high order to members of that faith. During the past year the attendance has numbered 300. The Academic Course covers a period of three years, and aims to thoroughly prepare pupils for the practical and everyday duties of life. A feature to which particular attention is given is that of special instruction in fine needle-work, painting and music. The exhibits of the handiwork of the pupils attest the wonderful proficiency attained under skillful instruction and compel the admiration of visitors. The graduating exercises to some extent differing in kind from those usual to other schools, possess a great interest for visitors, and are always largely attended.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The Public School system—it goes without saying, and needs no labored thesis by way of proof—is the foundation, the very corner-stone upon which rests the noble structure of political, social and religious blessings, blended into a harmonious whole, which we proudly call OUR COUNTRY. The walls of a building may long survive the corroding tooth of time though a pinnacle here or there be shattered, or a turret fall to earth; but let the foundation be sapped and the whole edifice is speedily in ruins. It behooves us then to look well to our PUBLIC SCHOOLS. In the nature of things all the education obtained by the great mass of our people must be had in and through these, and ends there. The first great aim therefore, of a city should ever be to provide sufficient school accommodation for all within its radius, and instruction of a character to best prepare the pupils to take their places and perform their duties as good, intelligent citizens. How do the Public Schools of Galesburg stand the test? Happily, well.

The first Public School was opened in the winter of 1839, in the upper story of the Academy building, its first teacher being a Mr. Van Meter, afterward noted as the manager of the Howard Mission in New York. The first public school house was built in 1839-40, under the direction of Hon. C. S. Colton. It was a rude building, at which the pupils of to-day would smile, and perchance contemptuously wonder if Learning could hold her court in such a hovel, but for ten years or more the rising generation mastered within

its walls the intricacies of the "Three R's—Reading, 'Riting and 'Rithmetic," amusing themselves in the intervals of recess by sliding along the floor between the benches, a defect in building having made it decidedly "slantindicular" as they expressed it.

In the year 1850 the school district was divided and new school houses built to accommodate the increasing attendance. By 1856 there were eight of these sub-districts in the town, and the need of a more efficient management and better classification of the schools was apparent to all. The eight districts were consolidated, and an attempt made to improve their efficiency, but the means at command were entirely inadequate and the Board of Directors were limited in their powers. Accordingly, in 1861, a special charter was obtained, by which the powers of the School Board were greatly enlarged, and it was made possible to proceed in a manner commensurate with the wants of the city.

From these beginnings has arisen our present noble system of Graded Schools, the boast and pride of our city no less than her higher institutions, and even nearer and dearer to the popular heart than they. The buildings now comprise a Primary building (a frame structure) in the First Ward, and elegant and commodious Ward Schools of brick and stone in the Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Wards. These with the High School building, a handsome edifice, erected 1866, as a stone tablet set in the wall bears witness, provide accommodation for the rising generation at the present writing. The total value of the school property is estimated at \$125,000.00.

The course of instruction comprehends eight grades, leading up to and preparing for a three years course in the High School. The instruction sought to be imparted is, as it should be, of a practical kind, fitting pupils for the common duties of life, and the methods employed are such as most conduce to that end. A strict discipline is maintained, and no infractions of needful regulations permitted. The present Superintendent of Schools, Mr. M. Andrews, has served in that capacity for eleven years, and it is not undue praise of him to say that none could have done better, few as well. His trying and often perplexing duties have been faithfully performed, and to the general satisfaction of all. An excellent judge of boy human nature—he was once a boy himself—a strict disciplinarian, a man of varied and extensive culture, he commands at once the respect and esteem of his subordinates. To him and the corps of teachers under his direction and to the Board of Education whose judicious liberality and wise direction inspire and sustain their efforts, the citizens of Galesburg owe a debt of gratitude not to be measured by money standards.

The enrollment in all the Departments for 1884 was nearly 1,800, the number of girls being slightly in excess of boys. The graduating class for the current year numbered 28, and their commencement exercises were highly creditable alike to their scholarship and instructors.

RAILROADS.

In December, 1854, the whistle of a locomotive first woke the echoes in Galesburg, and no doubt disturbed the sleepy equanimity of many a croaker of the genus frog. In that month the construction train of what is now the

Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad reached the town limits, and access by rail to the outer world was assured. It had been a hard struggle to secure this result, and only by persistent effort and a resolute determination to succeed on the part of a few far-sighted and public-spirited citizens had it been attained. The magnificent system known as the C. B. & Q. R. R., whose iron rails stretch in every direction and whose trains bear the prodigious uncounted thousands of acres, is the outgrowth of the doubtful beginning.

The Galesburg Division of the C. B. & Q., having this point as Headquarters, controls 504 miles of road. Here are located the offices of the General Superintendent, Jno. D. Besler, Esq.; the Superintendent of Illinois Lines, Mr. C. F. Resseguie; the Division Superintendent, Mr. F. C. Rice; the Attorney of the Company for Illinois, Hon. O. F. Price; the Division Master Mechanic, Mr. R. W. Colville, besides an army of Division Officers, Foremen, etc.

The extensive car-shops of the Company give employment to an average of over 800 men. These with the train-men and laborers, number little short of 1,400, all told, with a monthly pay-roll of over \$80,000. It is readily seen how important the railroad is to the material prosperity of the city, and the croakers at the oppression of the "Monopoly" should not forget this. If a business man, he certainly can not, as *pay day* is the great event of the month, and the day of reckoning that determines many a commercial venture.

The new Passenger Depot, corner Seminary and South streets, was opened to the public in May, 1884. It is an elegant and conveniently arranged building, of a composite style of architecture, and an ornament to the city. The passenger and waiting rooms on the first floor are models of neatness; and the ticket office, baggage office and dining rooms, are each after its kind, arranged with an eye to comfort and convenience. On the second floor are the offices of the General Superintendent, the Division Superintendent and his assistants, the Train-dispatchers and nineteen operators, and various other officials.

The C. B. & Q. Stock Yards are located in the southwestern part of the city, and have a capacity of 200 cars. Mr. Wilkins Seacord is the efficient Superintendent, and if dumb beasts could speak, would doubtless be the recipient of many a vote of thanks from his horned guests, who stop here for rest and refreshment, *en route* to the shambles.

We would gladly make a tour of the extensive Round Houses and Shops, noting much of interest by the way, but this our limited space forbids. The Car and Locomotive Department is under the charge of Robert W. Colville, Master Mechanic, the different shops being under the immediate supervision of foremen as follows: Car Shop, John T. Bassett; Machine Shop, Charles W. Butts; Boiler Shop, Lawrence Ryan; Blacksmith Shop, W. C. Hodges; Car Blacksmith Shop, George Loy; Coach Shop, E. W. Searle; Paint Shop, L. C. Way; Pattern Shop, B. Moulton; Wood Machine Shop, M. G. Kennedy; Copper Shop, Isaac Jones; Round House, day, Charles Erickson; night, Samuel W. Main; Repair Yard, B. J. Huff.

The C. B. & Q. has 104 miles of track in Knox county. The total equalized value of all its property in this county for the year 1884 was \$876,769.

the tax on which is \$21,501.42. The equalized value of all the company's property in this city is \$224,352, and the tax on same \$8,009.37.

The local Freight Department, which has been efficiently managed by Mr. James W. Cothren since 1854, is yearly gaining in importance. The returns for freights received during 1884 amounted to \$117,777.55. The shipments were correspondingly large.

FULTON COUNTY NARROW GAUGE RAILROAD.

This railroad was completed in 1882, and has now been in successful operation about three years. The road extends to Havana, a distance of 61 miles, and passes through a country rich in agricultural and natural resources. Much the greater part of our supply of bituminous coal is received over this line. This of itself is of great value to this city, as the price of fuel is not now dependent upon the state of the roads, as was formerly the case when supplies were hauled into the city by wagon. It is gratifying to know that the enterprise has proven a successful one, paying good dividends to the stockholders, and that further improvements to the line and additions to the rolling stock are contemplated. Mr. King Matthews is the efficient and obliging representative of the company for Galesburg, and is a gentleman whose genial bearing and many good qualities have won for him a host of friends.

Here ends for the present our list of railroads centering here. We are not without hope that some future chronicler, perchance as yet unborn, may have a longer one. It is matter of congratulation, as matters stand, that what we lack in number is made up in quality.

POST OFFICE.

It is difficult to realize how much of a necessity the Post Office is to our modern modes of life and thought. The system has grown from a small beginning to its present wonderful proportions so naturally and easily, that we fail to apprehend its full importance or appreciate its value. The first colonists of Galesburg were obliged to go to Knoxville for their mail. After some time a post-office was established and a weekly mail received. In those days the postmaster's hat could at a pinch serve as post-office, or the corner of some good old pioneer mother's cupboard. It is needless to say that the Galesburg Post Office of to-day has outgrown these primitive methods. The business of the office has kept pace with the growth of the city, and is constantly increasing. For twenty-four years the honorable position of Postmaster was held by Col. Clark E. Carr, to the general satisfaction of the public. The accession to power of the Democracy, at our last National election, involved a change in public officers, and Col. Carr, at the expiration of his term, was succeeded by M. J. Daugherty, Esq., the transfer being made on April 19th.

The following figures will give some idea of the immense amount of business transacted through the Post Office, and are a reliable indication of the general prosperity in all departments of business which it is our pleasing task to chronicle. The free delivery system has now been in operation for over two years, and the mistakes and imperfections necessarily incident to

the initiation of an untrained force have all passed away, and the carrier system, as at present conducted, may be said to give entire satisfaction to the public.

It is estimated that between two-thirds and four-fifths of all mail received at the Post Office is delivered by carriers, while for mail dispatched from the office the figures are nearly reversed.

As showing the extent to which the oft-reviled postal card has become a "necessary of life," it is interesting to know that nearly 400,000 are sold annually at this office.

This shows that the loss of revenue on account of postal reduction, which it was estimated might reach 25 per cent. of the gross income, has been almost overcome by the increased volume of business.

To meet this demand, drafts have been made upon the Department during the year to the amount of \$216,000.00.

Mr. Daugherty, who succeeds to the position so long and creditably filled by Col. Carr, is a gentleman of energy and ability, and enters upon his new duties with a firm determination to leave nothing undone upon his part that may promote the public interests. Already, in compliance with his urgent demands, the Post Office Department has entered into a contract by the terms of which a building especially planned for use as a post-office is to be put up and furnished with all modern improvements, Yale lock boxes, overhead casing, tile floors and plate glass fronts, the whole to be ready for occupancy by October 1st, proximo. This will be indeed a change from the present miserable quarters, and entitles Mr. Daugherty to the gratitude of all patrons of the office, irrespective of politics.

THE PLAIND DEALER is a staunch Republican paper, reserving to itself the right to criticize obnoxious men and measures; holding that the best way to keep the party in is to "turn the rascals' out." The Job Department of THE PLAIND DEALER is under the supervision of Iram Biggs, than whom none more competent can be found. THE PLAIND DEALER has a large circulation, and is a valuable advertising medium.

THE PRESS AND PEOPLE, (weekly) published by Gersh Martin, is an organ of Simon-pure Democracy, the only exponent of that party in Knox County. Gersh is a good fellow and an old newspaper man, and knows how to make his talk hit the bulls-eye every time. Since the election Democratic stock in Galesburg is looking up, and Gersh says the boom is working on his subscription list in a very satisfactory manner. If his lightning-rod had only reached a little higher, who knows what might have struck?

THE COUP D' ETAT, (monthly.) This is published during the College year by the Coup d' Etat Publishing Co., an association of students of Knox College. This rather absurd name, like a dunce-cap on a bright boy, covers a bright, newsy and excellently conducted periodical, devoted exclusively to the interest of students in general and Knox students in particular.

THE LOMBARD REVIEW, (monthly.) Is published by the Lombard Review Joint Stock Co., an association of students of Lombard University. It has only just completed its first year of journalistic life, but has already taken rank as one of the most ably conducted and interesting of its class. In addition to its literary merits the typographical excellence of the REVIEW speaks strongly in its favor.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.

The Galesburg Public Library is now a recognized institution of the City, and deserving of more extended mention than our limits will allow. Its

history begins with the organization in 1860 of the Young Men's Literary and Library Association. Some 250 of our most intelligent citizens organized and formed the nucleus of a library by donations of books, and money and so set the ball rolling. Prof. A. Hurd acted as Librarian and rendered most efficient service to the infant enterprise, giving freely of his valuable experience and time, as did many others. A small membership fee was charged, the income going to increase the Library. In 1866 the Library contained 2850 volumes. In 1873, the Association, perceiving that its field of usefulness might be greatly enlarged by such a step, tendered its accumulation of books to the City, and voluntarily gave up its being. The Galesburg Public Library has now upon its list close upon 15,000 volumes, and this number is being constantly increased by fresh purchases. The Directors are appointed by the Mayor, and have full discretion to act as in their judgment the best interests of the Library require. That they sometimes err is but proof that they are like the rest of us, human. The sum of \$2,500 is annually appropriated by the City Council, which, with the receipts from fines etc., constitute the available income. The Library rooms are well arranged and comfortable, and the institution is well patronized by the public. Any person of suitable age, upon being vouched for by a responsible party, may participate in its privileges, and the reading room, open at all times to the public, has a file of all the leading newspapers and periodicals.

MECHANICS' HOMESTEAD AND LOAN ASSOCIATION.

This institution, now entering upon its fourth year, is already a demonstrated success, and is recognized as a power for good in the advancement of the material and social interests of the city. The working-classes are the bone and sinew of a community, and any plan whose object is to help the working-man to help himself,—which is the purpose and aim of this association—is deserving of the highest commendation. In this association a person may invest his savings, however small, paying for each share of stock at the rate of 50 cents per month, or \$6.00 per annum. The State law provides that no salaries shall be paid to officers, with the exception of the Secretary, so that all the profits, above a small charge for running expenses, go directly to the stockholders. Each stockholder is entitled to a loan of \$100 on each share of stock held by him. The receipts of each month, if not less than \$100, are offered for loan at the monthly meeting, and the bidder offering the highest premium receives the loan.

During the three years of its existence, the Association has loaned out among its members nearly \$50,000, and has furnished the means for the building and improvement of many dwellings, thus directly helping in the enlargement and beautifying of our city. The demand for money is constantly on the increase, which is a gratifying indication that people are learning to appreciate its advantages. By paying a stated sum monthly, in most cases little more than the amount usually paid for rent, the borrower has the satisfaction of knowing that in a certain time his debt will be canceled by the appreciation of his stock.

A new series of stock is opened on the first of April and October in each year, and no better means of investment for small savings presents itself.

The conservative and judicious management of its affairs has done much to popularize the institution, and as its plans and methods become better understood, its sphere of usefulness will be widely extended. The Officers are Prof. Geo. Churchill, President; Isaac Jones, Vice-President; W. W. Washburn, Treasurer; Lake Sanborn, Secretary.

COVENANT MUTUAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION.

This Association is one of the institutions of Galesburg that is particularly worthy of note, as it is a living monument to the sagacity, integrity and indomitable energy and perseverance of its original promoters, who were, and are, citizens of this place, and because it has contributed largely to the enterprise and business interests of the city.

The COVENANT MUTUAL is distinctively an ODD FELLOWS' Insurance Association, and is designed to bring within the reach of every Odd Fellow a certain provision for his family, against the uncertainties of life and fortune, and its success has been almost phenomenal. Organized January 1st, 1877, with a mere handful of members, it has gone on, growing year by year in strength and usefulness, until on the 1st of June, 1885, it numbered 18,405 members, and had paid out to the widows and orphans of deceased members more than \$1,250,000, and has a surplus in the treasury of over \$100,000, invested chiefly in U. S. registered bonds; security rather than profit on investments being the first consideration of the management. The extent of the trusts imposed upon this Association by its members, is indicated by the \$60,000,000 at risk, and the manner in which these trusts are being fulfilled is shown by the munificent sum of \$1,250,000 already distributed to the beneficiaries of deceased members.

Infinite labor and detail are necessary to the transaction of this volume of business, requiring the services of many Special and District Agents, and an office force of from 14 to 16 clerks. The business transacted through the Galesburg Post Office is nearly one-third the entire business of the office. The postage on the 405,606 packages mailed by this Association during the year 1884 amounted to \$6,459.70, and this large business was the means of securing to Galesburg the free delivery of the mails, which has proved a great convenience to the citizens.

The present offices of this Association, although thought too large when first occupied, are rapidly proving too limited for the convenient and proper transaction of the increasing business of the Association, and to this fact may be attributed the agitation which led to the organization of the "Fraternity Hall Association," which will result in a handsome structure, to be erected on the corner of Main and Kellogg Streets, the second story of which will be occupied as offices by this Association.

To successfully organize and build up to its present magnitude such an institution as this, was no small work, involving as it does an executive ability broad enough to compass the future possibilities and requirements, and scrutinizing enough to scan the infinite detail necessary to cement its every part. That Col. E. F. Phelps, the efficient Secretary and General Manager, aided by the President of the Association, Hon. A. W. Berggren, and other earnest co-laborers, has combined these requisites, and accomplished this work, must ever be to him and them, a just cause of satisfaction and pride. And it is safe to predict that the Covenant Mutual Benefit Association will continue to dispense its blessings to the widows and orphans, long after its originators have passed away.

NOTE.—For the purpose of numbering, the City is divided North and South by Main Street, and East and West by Broad Street. All Streets running North and South take the prefix **NORTH** on all Street Signs North of Main Street, but have no prefix South of Main Street. In the same manner, all Streets intersecting Broad Street take the prefix **WEST** on all Street Signs West of Broad, but have no prefix East of that Street. In this Directory, however, the prefixes **EAST, WEST, NORTH** and **SOUTH** have been used to prevent possible misapprehension. The numbering of the Streets begins at the base line on Broad or Main Street, and each Block is assigned 100 Numbers, the second Block running from 100 to 200, the third to 300, and so on. By this plan, the number of a house being given, it is easy to calculate its distance from the dividing line in either direction.

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

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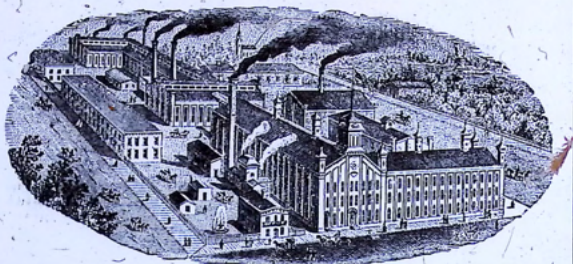
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
