



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

## INTRODUCTORY.

The present volume, the third in the series of COLVILLE'S DIRECTORY OF THE CITY OF GALESBURG, is now offered to its patrons. The Publishers trust it will be found worthy of their confidence and approval, and to this end have stinted neither labor nor expense.

As the result of a most careful, painstaking and thorough canvass of the city, the Publishers present a NAME DIRECTORY embracing 5,800 names, being an increase of 924 over that of two years ago. The steady growth of population is conclusively shown by comparison with former lists. Holland's Directory for 1882 gave 3,803 names; the first issue of the COLVILLE DIRECTORY, in 1883, gave 4,442 names; the second, in 1885, gave 4,876 names, and the present volume gives 5,800. The canvassers made return of 2,724 families, embracing 12,536 souls, and 2,295 persons without families; making an actual population of 14,831 within the corporate limits. The figure will assuredly go beyond 15,000 before the end of 1887, and the Publishers confidently set the mark at 20,000 for the issue of 1889-90.

The Map accompanying this work shows in colors the recent additions to the city, the new lines of railway, the street railway routes, etc. Much interesting matter concerning the early history and growth of our city will be found in the HISTORICAL DEPARTMENT. Under the head of EDITORIAL MENTION, the leading business houses are appropriately noticed.

With sincere thanks to the enterprising business men of Galesburg for their continued confidence and generous support, the Publishers submit to them the result of their labors.

## THE CITY OF GALESBURG.

### A BRIEF SKETCH OF ITS HISTORY.

Within the limited space available for the purpose in a work of this kind, it would be useless to attempt more than a brief outline of the history of our fair city, referring the curious reader in search of fuller and more detailed information of men and events to the great book of unwritten history, whose records are only to be found in the memory of the few remaining and fast disappearing "Original Colonists."

These Original Colonists, the pioneers in whose brains was first conceived the germ of the idea which took shape and form on the map of Illinois as Galesburg, were a little band of earnest Christian men in the East, who, in the early days, before the era of railroads and telegraphs, which by the annihilation of time and space have made the opposite ends of the earth nearer neighbors than were places fifty miles apart in those times, were deeply impressed with the educational needs of the new country west of the Ohio, and resolved upon the founding of an institution of higher education, whose corner-stone should be Christianity, and its chief end the practical Christian training of young men.

Their plans to this end were thoughtfully matured and carefully drawn up, and, when the project took the shape of a fixed purpose, a purchasing committee was sent out to select a suitable location, where a tract of land extensive enough and otherwise adapted to the end in view might be secured. The committee came, saw and purchased, and in the fall of 1835, a town site was laid out, the town being by the choice of the Colonists named Galesburg, in honor of the Rev. George W. Gale, whose efforts and zeal in the work were thus fittingly recognized by his associates.

In the early spring of 1836 the pioneer families set their faces westward, turning their backs upon the comforts of settled society, severing

the ties of kindred and friendship, but sustained by the courage of hope and the inspiration of a noble idea. Of their adventures by the way, the "moving accidents by flood and field" that they passed through, there is no record. Their pilgrimage, though to a greater distance, was not vexed by the delays that marked the journeyings of the Chosen People of old, and the little band in good time reached their destination. Preparations were at once set on foot, with true Anglo-Saxon pluck, to occupy and possess the land. Temporary accommodations for some were found in little settlements near by; ground was allotted to each in due proportion, and rude shelters of hewn logs speedily improvised. A count of heads, from the curly pate of childhood to the grizzled poll of mature age, shows 222 all told. Not many, but much! And they toiled, and hoped, and grew apace, until in 1846, the end of the first decade, there is a population of 800, comfortably housed, with several "country stores," a mill, blacksmith shop, and so forth. Religious privileges had been among the first of the new community's needs to receive attention—as was to be expected in one so founded,—and the old First Church, which a short time since celebrated her semi-centennial, may fairly claim to be a twin sister of the village, and proudly wears the title of "Mother of Churches."

By this time Galesburg had grown to be considerable of a place, for a small one, and was already noted among her neighbors for the superior educational advantages she offered, and the high moral tone of her society. This good report naturally attracted the better element of settlers with growing families to educate, and tended to increased prosperity. In these halcyon days vice and profligacy were scarcely known, profanity would have shocked the echoes of the staid and sober village, while the saloon—as for our degenerate days!—was a thing forbidden within its bounds. It is to be supposed that John Barleycorn had his secret devotees even here, and doubtless many a trip to the county seat—*tempora mutantur*; but thirsty neighbors now come to us!—five miles away, had its real motive in a consuming thirst which a liquid of more potency than *capra pura* was required to satisfy. It is not hard to imagine the day's pleasures, enhanced by the spice of the forbidden, and clouded only by thought of the inevitable home-return, and the quaking of spirit and assumption of owl-like gravity of mien and over-erectness of gait as the returning prodigal came in sight of home. But these black sheep were few, and served a useful part, perhaps, in pointing the moral of many a vigorous-pulpit homily.

The railway communication with Chicago was secured through

the building of what is now known as the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad. In the location and construction of this road a prominent and honorable part was taken by some of the leading business men of the embryo city, who courageously risked their means in the furtherance of the enterprise. Had Galesburg not possessed such self-sacrificing, public-spirited men, the opportunity would have been lost, and all the possibilities of future growth forever blasted. It is said that a sister city had at that time equal chance with Galesburg of securing the location of the new line, but her citizens were possessed with the belief that there was no need to worry or spend money to get it: "They've got to come here, anyhow." As events proved, they didn't have to. In this connection, it is proper matter for self-congratulation that the old spirit of enterprise still lives in the Galesburg of to-day, and the element, conspicuous from its very littleness, which clutches its pockets lest a stray dime escape on a mission of humanity, and which would set a brake on the car of progress to save the cost of axle-grease, is forced from very shame to join in the procession and contribute to help pay the music.

The opening of railway communication marked the dawning of a new era for Galesburg. A new and rapid growth set in. The railway shops gave employment to an ever-increasing army of mechanics; manufacturing industries multiplied; general business of all kinds enlarged and began to assume city-like proportions. The "country store" had lived its day and "must go." The simplicity of life and manner natural to a small community, with a common origin and purpose was at an end. Other interests took the field against the hitherto predominant one, and the first shriek of the locomotive was recognized as the signal of a conflict whose end is not yet.

At the close of the second decade, 1856, the population of the town had grown to about 4,000. In the year following, just twenty-one years from its first settlement, a city charter was obtained and the City of Galesburg took her place among the sisterhood of cities. Since that time the city has nearly quadrupled in population, and this in despite of the fact that she has sent forth her sons by the scores and hundreds to assist in peopling and upbuilding the new countries constantly calling for men and money to develop their resources. While it may be said with truth that many new Western cities exceptionally situated, which have not completed their fifth decade, can boast a larger population than ours, we can safely challenge comparison in other respects with any. The new map accompanying this work will show the great extent of territory embraced within our boundaries, and the wonderful increase during the

last two years. It is estimated that the number of dwellings of all sorts and sizes within the corporate limits exceeds 3,200. The laboring classes as a rule own their homes and there is evidence every year more and more of the growth of a spirit of neatness and a commendable pride in the improvement of the surroundings of even the humblest homes. There is abundant room for expansion in every direction, no material hindrance nearer than the Mississippi, forty miles away, interposing a barrier. The lack of public parks, which was felt to be a serious misfortune, is largely compensated for of late by the ease of access to the grounds east of the city, known as Highland Park. This comprises some fifty acres of beautifully wooded country, diversified hill and dale, with artificial lakes and every convenience for pleasure. Here, at a merely nominal cost, the poorest family may have a taste of the pleasures of wood and field and the liberal use made of the privilege shows how much it is appreciated. The streets of the city are well lighted with gas, supplemented where the gas mains do not extend by gasoline lamps. The majority of the stores in the business portion of the city are lighted by electricity, and the streets in their vicinity are as light as noonday.

The wise policy inaugurated by the city some years since of making a certain limited extent of street improvement of a permanent, substantial character each year, working upon a well-defined plan, comprehending the grading, paving and curbing of all the principal streets, is being steadily pursued. At the same time the sewerage system is being extended, all that is done being done with a view to the necessities of the future. Neat and permanent walks of brick or concrete are rapidly taking the place of the dangerous wooden walk which has often been a source of litigation and expense to the city in days past, and it is the opinion of many that the city could well afford to bear the whole expense of these safer walks and save money by the change.

A great want of our city, and a growing one, has been the lack of water for domestic and manufacturing purposes and for protection against fire. There had been for some years a partial protection to the business blocks of the city by a system of mains connected with the steam pumps and water tanks of two of our leading manufacturing companies, but this was plainly inadequate, and there was a feeling that there should be something more done. When this feeling was at its height, Nathan Shelton, of Freeport, Ill., visited the city, looked over the ground, declared his ability to secure water in abundance, organized a company, secured a valuable franchise from the city, set to work laying mains, sinking wells, erecting buildings, etc., and in the summer of 1884 declared

the works ready for business. The prescribed test was satisfactorily performed and the contract was ratified by the City Council. Soon, however, suspicion arose that all was not right, the water was impure, the quantity insufficient; and suspicion deepened to certainty that the city had been most outrageously deceived. Public sentiment was unanimous in condemnation of the fraud and demanded that steps be taken to free the city from the contract. At the city election in April, 1885, a Mayor and Board in harmony with the popular feeling were elected, and the city mains which had been conditionally sold to the Water Company forcibly repossessed. A history of the litigation following this action of the city would be out of place here. Suffice it to say that there is every prospect of a speedy and satisfactory settlement of the vexed and vexing question, which shall substantially sustain the position taken by the city, and leave it free to attempt the difficult but necessary-to-be-solved problem of a pure and sufficient water supply, unhampered by the onerous conditions of an unwise contract,—a dearly-bought experience which will in future stand us in good stead. As one lesson of the Shelton experiment it is beyond question that the city should own the works. The danger from jobbery in that case, is far exceeded by the certainty of robbery in the other, and the remedy would not require to be sought in the expensive intricacies of a Court of Chancery.

In a sanitary point of view, Galesburg takes rank among the most favored cities of the world. She can hardly claim equality with that fabled far-away city of the long-ago, whose dwellers had entirely lost the knack of dying—a most sweet and decorous thing to do, at times, by the way—and were reduced to the hard lines of moving outside to die, when existence had grown to be a positive burden. For the year 1884 the death-rate was a little over twelve to the thousand; 1885 showed a slight decrease, and for the year 1886, the total number of deaths from all causes was 157; being at the rate of 10.46 in an estimated population of 15,000. A comparison of the death-rate of other cities, as officially given below, will substantiate our claim that Galesburg is pre-eminently a goodly city to live in:

Much to our regret, the statistics of birth are not available, and we must content ourselves with the assurance, easily verified by the most casual observation, that the Divine injunction to "multiply and replenish" is abundantly honored.

The moral healthfulness of our city is no less noticeable. The old leaven of the founders is still a working power in elevating the moral tone of society, and the vicious element, though present here as elsewhere—the Devil got into Eden, even, as the children of Adam know to their sorrow—is held in check by a powerful public sentiment. No more striking proof of the law-abiding character of our citizens could be adduced than is given in the simple statement that the care of the public peace is devolved upon a city marshal and seven policemen, nor are their duties arduous. The total number of arrests for twelve months was 367—just one a day, and two to go on. Of these 131 were for drunkenness, and a large majority of the remainder for minor offenses.

The wonderful progress in building and public improvements it was our pleasure to chronicle two years ago has continued unchecked. Many enterprises that were then only commenced or in contemplation, have been pushed to completion, and numerous others have taken shape and form, and are to-day tangible proof of the rapid forward march of our city. The new Passenger Depot of the C. B. & Q. is the envy of inland cities. The New Court House, just completed during the past winter at a cost of nearly \$100,000, is a beautiful and stately structure of magnificent proportions. It is a fitting Temple of Justice, a credit to the county and a crowning ornament to the city. Knox Seminary rejoices in the addition of a large wing, giving increased accommodations for pupils

and enhancing the appearance of the building. The new Church of Corpus Christi, erected by the Catholic Society, takes the lead as the handsomest church edifice in the city. The contract has been let for the erection of a new school building to cost \$25,000, which will occupy the site of the frame building known as the Central Primary. Several fine business blocks have been recently completed, among them notably Fraternity Hall block, a beautiful specimen of modern architecture, and quite the handsomest block in the city. Other business blocks are projected and will be built during the present season. In the residence portion of the city the most indubitable evidence is afforded of the really immense proportions of the "boom" that has struck us. On every street, in whatever direction one turns, out to the farthest limits, new dwellings are found to-day, where yesterday were vacant lots. To meet the demand for building lots large tracts of land to the east, north and west have been platted and subdivided, and find ready sale. A pleasing feature of the present building boom is the diversity in the style of architecture; our builders have at last caught the tune of the time, and the old nondescript one-pattern box with a roof to it has forever fallen.

The street-car line has been an important factor in the growth and extension of the city, and has won a strong hold on popular favor by its judicious management and the liberal spirit manifested in its dealings with the public. The line will be extended as rapidly as necessary to meet the demands of traffic. An extension northward will be made at once, to be speedily followed by others.

During the last few months the all absorbing topic of interest to citizens of Galesburg was the question, Can we secure the location of the proposed extension of the Atchison Railroad through our city? It was felt to be a vital question, one upon the determination of which our future for weal or woe largely depended. There were a few that contended that we had but to open our mouths and the plum would drop in as soon as it ripened, but then there was danger the fruit might be plucked while green. Leading citizens interested themselves in the matter, public meetings were held, and much enthusiasm aroused; a committee was appointed to confer with the officials of the Atchison, and subscriptions called for to secure the right of way free of cost to the company, which was the extent of their demand. Between \$60,000 and \$75,000 in subscriptions were raised for this purpose, and the necessary guarantees made by the citizens and accepted by the company. At the present writing the work of construction of the Chicago, Santa Fe & California Railroad is under full headway, the grading both east and west of the

city is being pushed rapidly forward, and trains will soon be running on the new road. The passenger depot will be built on North Broad Street near Waters, and the plans show a handsome structure, to cost \$28,000. The freight depot will probably be located on North Academy Street.

It is almost impossible to over-estimate the importance to the business interests of Galesburg of another first-class line of direct communication with the large business centers. It means the opening to our merchants of new markets. It means competition in freight rates. It means that in the future our natural advantages, which should make us second to no inland city in the State, shall not be turned to naught, and our enterprising manufacturers forced to remove to other localities. Henceforth we can invite manufacturers to locate in our midst, offering them a large and constantly growing city, without a dollar of debt, educational facilities such as hardly another city in our broad land can equal, low freights on their manufactures, guaranteed by the natural competition of two of the leading trunk lines in the United States; ease of access to markets by lines radiating in all directions—in short, every essential to success.

Our business men have shown themselves keenly alive to the importance of seizing the opportunity. Will they improve it as they may? We cannot doubt it. They are, as a class, wide-awake, energetic and enterprising. With the removal of the dead-weight which has checked all attempts to extend their bounds, there will be a renewal of effort to secure the trade of all the large territory naturally tributary to Galesburg. We have long been headquarters for traveling men of other cities, who found here a convenient point of departure; we shall soon be headquarters for trade as well.


Enough has been said to prove that our "boom" is a substantial affair, has come to stay with us, and is moving steadily on. There is every reason to believe that we may confidently expect the doubling of our present population within the next decade, with a commensurate increase in trade and appreciation of property values. To this end let the efforts of all good citizens be put forth, and the cry be Forward! all along the line.

#### EDUCATIONAL.

Galesburg is known far and wide for her superior educational advantages, and the fame of her schools has been a potent influence in drawing hither a most desirable class of citizens. The title of "College City" is hers by right of birth, and every good citizen takes pride in helping to sustain the institutions which have made Galesburg what she is. Foremost among these institutions of learning stands

#### KNOX COLLEGE.

This college was founded upon a Plan of Christian Benevolence. This is the term used by the founders in submitting their project for the approval of Christians seeking higher education for their children, under distinctly Christian influences. Nothing so well expresses the ruling idea which has shaped the policy and determined the position of Knox College from the beginning. Her early history has been dwelt upon in the sketch of the city preceding this, and need not be repeated. Galesburg is the child of the college, and like a good child, although she has grown away from the parental apron-strings, she is still mindful of the relationship, and proud of it as well. Knox College was founded in 1837, but was not fully organized until four years later. Her first




KNOX COLLEGE.

of graduates was sent out in 1845. Of late years the college has enjoyed a high degree of prosperity, and is recognized as one of the leading institutions of learning in the country. The standard of scholarship is high, the course of study broad, thorough and comprehensive. The honorable President, Newton Bateman, widely known as an eminent educator, is ably seconded by a most efficient Faculty of Instructors.

Knox College has no need to be ashamed of her children. With the Roman matron she may say, "These are my jewels." Her graduates are found in all positions in business and professional life, and many have attained to high places of honor and trust. As marking the excellence of the training we note another victory won for Knox in the Inter-State Oratorical contest held at Bloomington recently, Mr. John H. Finley

ing the successful contestant. This year her semi-centennial was celebrated, and a great ingathering of her children testified to their sincere love for their mother. The exercises occupied a week, every day being crowded with events of interest. It was an occasion the like of which Galesburg has never seen, and brought into strong relief the deep and abiding affection and interest felt by all in the welfare of the institution. It was indeed a grand Jubilee, and the "year of trumpets" will be forever memorable in the history of Knox College. It is believed that the enthusiasm and zeal kindled at this celebration will find expression in a large increase to the endowment fund, and the way thus cleared for future progress, with position and prestige greatly enhanced.

The Collegiate course is complete and thorough, and is open to all who can pass the required examination. A Scientific course, excluding the ancient languages, is provided for such as do not desire to take the Classical course.



KNOX SEMINARY.

The Seminary is designed to furnish a liberal course of instruction to young ladies. The course of study occupies four years and affords every facility for thorough mental discipline and liberal culture. All College courses are open to young ladies on an equal footing with the young men, and the advantages of instruction by the President and Professors of the College, and the use of the college libraries, apparatus and cabinets, are special features not to be enjoyed at seminaries unconnected with a college. Young ladies from abroad are provided with board and rooms in the Seminary building, to which a large addition has recently been made.

Knox Academy is an adjunct to the College, its primary purpose being to fit students of both sexes for admission to the College or Seminary. A full English course is provided for such as do not wish to pursue the Classical course.


#### LOMBARD UNIVERSITY.

This institution is under the control of the Universalist denomination and is avowedly non-sectarian in its teachings. It was founded as the Illinois Liberal Institute in 1852, but the plan of instruction was widened and a full collegiate course adopted in 1857, when a charter was obtained under the name of Lombard University, the name being chosen as a recognition of the generosity of Benjamin Lombard, Sr., who presented the site of the University and other property, valued in those days at \$20,000. Through no little adversity and trying times Lombard has passed in the years that have elapsed, since her halls were first opened to students, but she is now on a solid financial basis, with an endowment already reaching to \$100,000, and constantly increasing through the liberality of friends of unsectarian higher education. The attendance grows yearly and the prospects are flattering for a great increase in all departments during the coming year. Lombard is deservedly proud of the record made by her graduates in political and professional fields, many having risen to positions of honor and trust.

The courses of study embrace a full Collegiate course with thorough Classical instruction, but designed to combine practical knowledge with intellectual culture and discipline; a Literary course, in which more particular attention is devoted to Belles Lettres than in either of the others. A Theological Department is a recent addition to the University, for the training of students desirous of preparing for the ministry. The first class in this department graduated in 1885. It is already recognized as a valuable auxiliary to the denomination and is steadily growing in favor. In the Preparatory department students may prepare for entering the College courses, or perfect themselves in the higher English branches.

The President of the institution, Dr. Nehemiah White, is filling his eleventh year in that honorable and responsible position. He is a man of liberal culture and extensive attainments, eminently fitted by nature and education for the office. The Faculty of Instructors, several of whom have been identified with the fortunes of Lombard from the beginning, are each and all gentlemen of solid learning and zealous in promoting the cause of liberal education.

Many improvements have been made in the University buildings and grounds, the College cabinets have been greatly enlarged and additional

chemical apparatus provided. The Library now numbers over 7,000 volumes, and is especially rich in rare and valuable theological and historical works. The advantages of these collections are open to all students without restriction.

### ST. JOSEPH'S ACADEMY.

This institution was erected in 1879, and is under the supervision of the Sisters of Providence. It affords the advantages of a high course of academic training to the children of Catholic parentage, and during the few years it has been in operation has accomplished much in its special sphere. Instruction in the religious tenets of the church is carefully and systematically given, and a wholesome respect for lay and ecclesiastical authority inculcated. The attendance the present year numbers 275. Particular attention is given to instruction in music, painting and drawing, and plain and fancy needlework. So noted have the "Sisters" become in these lines that many attend the Academy regularly to receive instruction. The graduating exercises are different from those of other schools and always attract a large number of visitors. The Academy is doing an excellent educational work in a sphere peculiarly its own, and is deserving of great credit for the manner in which it is performed.

### THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The Public Schools of Galesburg are in every sense worthy of her high fame as a City of Colleges. Before the College must come the lesser schools, as the A B C is perforce the beginning of all knowledge. Education for the great majority must be obtained, if at all, in and through the Public School. Hence the first great need of a community alive to its duties and responsibilities, is to see that its growing youth—the future men and women who will make or mar its fortunes—are provided with means of instruction sufficient to their wants and adapted to prepare them for their part in life.

In the early days of Galesburg, beauty of architecture was not the distinguishing characteristic of her public schools. It was in 1839-40 that the first school house was built, a rude affair, its four walls guiltless of paint or attempt at ornament, a shelter from the pelting storm or wintry blast, but nothing more. The pupil of to-day, accustomed to his easy desk and convenient seat, the carefully adjusted light and ventilation, the steam-heating apparatus, regulating the temperature by a twist of the wrist, and the thousand-and-one conveniences that are hardly thought of, so habituated is he to them, would elevate his nose to an

angle, were he called upon to take his seat in such surroundings. As the town grew in size new school houses were built, and the best that was possible with the limited means and powers then possessed was done, but it was not until 1861 that the present system was organized by special charter.

The school buildings of Galesburg are seven in number, and are with one exception, elegant and commodious structures of brick and stone, heated by steam, well lighted and ventilated, and provided with every requisite for successful teaching. The High School Building was erected in 1866 at a cost of \$50,000, is situated in the heart of the city, and is a building of great architectural excellence. During the summer a handsome building to cost \$25,000, the contract for which is already let, will take the place of the Central Primary, the only remaining frame building belonging to the school system.

The course of instruction comprehends eight grades, leading up to and preparing for a three year course in the High School. The instruction sought to be imparted is of a practical kind, such as will fit scholars for the common duties of life, and enabling such as wish to continue their education to readily enter the College and Seminary classes. The discipline of the schools is strictly maintained, and the Superintendent has the hearty co-operation of the Board of Education in his labors to this end. The present Superintendent of Schools, Mr. W. L. Steele, succeeded to the position upon the retirement of Mr. M. Andrews. It is simply recording a fact patent to all to say that under his management the high standard of excellence attained by his predecessor has been fully maintained, and a continued progress made. Of late years education has come to be recognized as a science, and great advances are continually making in methods of teaching. To apprehend what is good among all the new theories and to keep abreast the times is now-a-days the first requisite of a successful teacher. This qualification Prof. Steele possesses in an eminent degree. By his firm yet genial manner, he has won and retains the respect of teachers and pupils, and the school system of Galesburg is indeed fortunate in its efficient head.

The enrollment in all the schools for 1886 was slightly over 1,800. In the High School proper, 120. The graduating class of 1887 numbered 35, and the commencement exercises were alike creditable to the class and teachers.

### RAILROADS.

In December, 1854, the construction train of what is now known as the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad, reached the town limits,

and the era of railroads dawned for Galesburg. The location of the road had been secured only by persistent effort on the part of a few public spirited citizens whose names should not be suffered to be forgotten.

The Galesburg Division of the C. B. & Q. R. R., having this point as headquarters, controls 528 miles of road. Here are located the offices of the Superintendent of Illinois lines, Mr. C. F. Resseguie; the Division Superintendent, F. C. Rice; the General Attorney for Illinois, Hon. O. F. Price; the Division Freight Agent, Mr. R. T. Davis; the Division Master Mechanic, Mr. Robt. W. Colville; Mr. C. H. Fuller, Manager Western Union Telegraph Company; and a small army of subordinate officers, foremen, clerks, etc.

During the year 1886, a branch line to Rio was constructed, materially reducing the distance between Peoria and Rock Island, and placing us in direct line with their new northern route, the C. B. & N. It is especially as a direct link in this system and an outlet for the immense freight and coal traffic of the company that this short line was built. The Railroad water works system has also been enlarged, a new reservoir constructed, the old ones increased in capacity and 10-inch iron mains laid between the shops and works. The Company has thus secured a supply of water ample for any emergency, and the shops and depots are provided with stand-pipes and hose, and every facility for the prompt extinguishment of fire.

On the second floor of the Passenger Depot, corner of Seminary and South streets, are the offices of the various heads of departments, the train dispatchers and telegraph officials, and others connected with the company's business. The Freight Depot is located at the foot of Prairie street, in an old frame building ill-adapted to the requirements of the immense freight traffic of the road. Stretching away to the south and west of the Passenger Depot are the shops of the Company, covering a great area, and giving employment to an average of over 800 men. Including the train-men and laborers, the pay roll comprises not far from 1,400 names, receiving monthly nearly \$80,000. When we reflect that these 1,400, with the families dependent upon them, represent an aggregate of 5,000 persons—a good *third* of our entire population—the importance of the C. B. & Q. to the prosperity of Galesburg is easily understood. In extending the hand of welcome to the new road, let us not commit the folly of turning the cold shoulder to the grand old "Q."

The extensive Round Houses and Shops, fitted with all the manifold appliances of modern mechanical skill, possess much attraction for the

intelligent observer. The tinkle of hammers, the buzz of saws, the whirl of planes, the click of multifarious machines, and the undertone of the great engine throbbing ceaselessly like a great heart sending the pulsating life currents to the remotest members, all blend in a grand diapason of labor, and fill the mind with wonder at its achievements. A detailed description of what is to be seen in a tour of the shops would be of much interest, but we must forbear. The Car and Locomotive Department is under the charge of Robert W. Colville, Master Mechanic, the different shops being under the immediate supervision of foremen as follows: Car shop, John T. Bassett; Machine shop, A. W. Erickson; Boiler shop, William Lalor; Blacksmith shop, W. C. Hodge; Cast-Blacksmith shop, George Loy; Coach shop, E. W. Searle; Paint shop, L. C. Way; Pattern shop, B. Moulton; Wood Machine shop, Wm. J. Phelps; Copper shop, Isaac Jones; Round house, day, Charles Erickson; night, Samuel W. Main; Repair yard, B. J. Huff.

The C. B. & Q. has 116 miles of track in Knox County. The total equalized value of all its property for 1886 was \$880,247, on which the taxation was \$24,780.14. The business of the road is constantly increasing as new territory is made tributary to it. The local Freight Department is under the efficient management of Mr. James W. Cothren, an old and highly esteemed official whose years of service date from 1854. The returns for freights received approximate \$116,000, and for shipments something less than half that amount. The Stock Yards are under the able management of Mr. Wilkins Seacord. During the year about 12,000 cars of stock in transit were handled, the care and feed of the same being no small labor.

#### FELTON COUNTY NARROW GAUGE RAILROAD.

The Narrow Gauge Railroad extends from this point to Havana, a distance of 61 miles. The Road passes through a fine agricultural country, and what is a matter of prime importance to us, an excellent coal country. Since the opening of the road in 1882, and increasingly every year our supply of bituminous coal comes over this line. We are thus in a large measure independent of the weather in this regard, and are no longer the victims of high prices, with a prospective coal famine staring us in the face every time it rained. Constant improvements are being made to the line, new depots built at several points, and additional rolling stock provided. The Company's Passenger and Freight Depot is situated a little southeast of the C. B. & Q. Passenger Depot. Mr. E. T. Maury succeeded Mr. King Matthews as Agent of the Company, and

is deservedly popular with our citizens from his prompt business methods and many estimable qualities.

At this point hitherto, our chronicle of railroads has come to an untimely stop. It is with no ordinary pleasure that we are now enabled to extend the list and welcome the advent to our city and columns of another line. The

is an extension of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway system, which will, when completed, form one of the great trans-continental routes, stretching in an unbroken line from Chicago westward to the Pacific. During the past year the air was full of rumors that this road would be built, and that proper effort on the part of citizens might secure its location through Galesburg. It was felt by all that a crisis was upon us, that this was the one opportunity which if let slip, was forever lost. Great interest was aroused, and, with much talk, a goodly amount of active work was done. It was ascertained that the Company was well-disposed toward us, but considered that the right of way through the city should be given it free of expense, and made this condition a *sine qua non*. With this ultimatum before it, the committee representing the citizens set to work vigorously to raise the amount considered necessary, some \$75,000, and thanks to the liberality of our public-spirited citizens and men of business, were soon in a position to guarantee the right-of-way to the Company. Thus the new road from Kansas City to Chicago, *via* Galesburg, became a fixed fact. Work is being rapidly pushed in all directions, and trains will be running before the end of 1887. In connection with the grading through the city, the bed of the creek will be changed in places and low ground filled in, altering and vastly improving in appearance the valley of Cedar Fork. The Passenger Depot will be located on North Broad street, near Waters. The plans for this building show a handsome structure, estimated to cost \$28,000, which will be a decided ornament to that part of the city. The Freight Depot and Yards will be several blocks to the west, near the Main street crossing.

Great things are expected for Galesburg from the opening of the new road. We shall then be on the line of two of the most important and wealthiest railroad systems of the Continent. There will result a healthful competition in freight rates, a great desideratum to manufacturing and commercial interests, which in the past have languished. Cool, level-headed men predict the doubling of our population within the next decade, with the increased business which is implied therewith. How-

It may be said that it is certain that if the new road confers upon the city the full benefit of the benefits derived from our connection with the C. B. & Q. it will have been well worth the effort and expense of securing.

#### THE POST OFFICE.

No well regulated community now-a-days could keep house without a Post Office. It is said that we do not fully appreciate our blessings until they take their flight. So the blessings of a well-ordered postal system are scarcely understood until a snow-embargo or spring freshet temporarily shuts us out from communication with the rest of the world. At once business and social affairs are in a jangle, and everything at sixes and sevens until communication is restored. The growth of the American postal system from the chaotic no-system of a short quarter century ago is something wonderful to contemplate. The results of European experience have been assimilated to American needs and improved upon by American ingenuity, and today we have the most complete postal system, taken as a whole, of any country in the world.

The Galesburg Post Office is located in a building specially designed for its occupancy, and is furnished with a complete "Yale" outfit of the most approved pattern. Being a "Free Delivery" office, only a limited number of boxes are required for the use of parties living mostly beyond the delivery limits. The Postmaster, M. J. Dougherty, Esp., was appointed rather more than two years ago by President Cleveland, succeeding Col. Clark E. Carr, who retired from office with an honorable record of nearly twenty five years' service. Mr. Dougherty is an obliging and thoroughly competent gentleman, whose ambition is to maintain the high record of the office, and to faithfully and acceptably discharge his duties.

The business of the Post Office in all its departments shows year by year a constant increase, indicative of the general growth of the city. In the Money order Department the aggregate of the yearly business transacted will reach nearly \$2,000,000. The net surplus revenue to the Department is close upon \$12,000 per annum.

#### THE REPUBLICAN-REGISTER.

The Daily and Weekly published by the Galesburg Printing Co., is the leading newspaper of Knox county, and is, as its name indicates, Republican in politics. It is pre-eminently a clean paper, and its columns are never disgraced by vulgarity or personal abuse. Hence it has come to be recognized as deserving public confidence, and being deserving, has

secured a firm hold on popular favor. In all matters pertaining to the advancement of city interests the *Republican-Register* is always up and doing, and has done good service in arousing and stimulating that spirit of progress which is the motive power in the "boom" which all good citizens rejoice to see. Soon after removing into the new and spacious quarters now occupied by the company, covering an area of 4056 square feet, the Daily was considerably enlarged, an entire new dress purchased, and arrangements made by which telegraphic news was added. By these changes the Daily has been made a very creditable sheet, comparing favorably with Peoria and Quincy Dailies. As a result of the improvements made the subscription list of the Daily has reached to a plump 800, and means to reach the thousand mark before the year is out. The Weekly has a large circulation outside the city, and makes a special feature of correspondence from the small towns of the county, a feature which makes it sought after in those places, and also has a good effect in drawing trade to the "Burg." Both Daily and weekly are valuable advertising mediums, and are so regarded by our merchants. The Job Rooms of the Company are well equipped with type, presses, etc., and turn out work of a high grade of excellence. The Business Manager, Mr. S. W. Grubb, is a thoroughly practical man, and much of the success of the Company is due to his judicious management. Mr. Z. Beatty, the Editor-in-Chief, is a veteran newspaper man, choke-full of the wisdom that experience teaches, and his skillful hand has guided the course of the paper safely through many a stormy time. Mr. Fred R. Jelliff is City Editor, and in his capacity of news-gatherer uses a wise discrimination in drawing the line between news and gossip.

#### THE PLAINDEALER.

(Weekly) is published by the Plaindealer Printing Co., Henry Emerich, Business Manager; Iram Biggs, Superintendent of Job Department; R. W. Sweeney, City Editor. The *Plaindealer* is a staunch Republican paper, supporting the principles and nominees of the Republican Party, but reserving to itself the right to criticize such men and measures as in its opinion are deserving of censure. The *Plaindealer* has a heavy city list, and circulates largely in this and adjoining counties. It is on this account a valuable advertising medium. Mr. Emerich is an "old-timer," and has few equals in filling a "stick." He is an active member of the G. A. R., and the A. O. U. W., and finds time despite the multiplied cares of business to put in his work in these lines. Mr. Biggs is just recovering from the shock to his system of a two-or-three weeks jaunt to the



His hope, the first respite from labor we have known him to indulge in. He is a good practical printer, and has quite an inventive turn of mind, which will make him rich or poor by-and-bye—we forget which.

#### THE PRESS AND PEOPLE.

Weekly is published by Gersh. Martin. This paper is the representative of Democracy, not in the abstract, but in particular, and has no qualms to make for the faith that is in it. Nor does it hesitate to fight boldly and vigorously men or measures which from its standpoint deserve to be hauled over the coals. As the only paper in Knox County devoted to the support of Democratic principles, the *Press and People* has a wide field, peculiarly its own, and consequently, a large circulation. Mr. Martin succeeded to Gen. M. S. Barnes, in the proprietorship of this paper, and since he assumed control has gained a wide reputation for plain speech and fearless criticism. Mr. Martin is an able newspaper man, a ready writer with a terse, telling style. The subscription list is placed at 1,856, and still growing.

#### RAILROAD BRAKEMEN'S JOURNAL.

Monthly is the representative organ of the Brotherhood of Railroad Brakemen, and is published by the Grand Lodge B. of R. R. B., Mr. Ed. O'Shea being Editor. Since the *Journal* came under Mr. O'Shea's management it has vastly improved in all respects, and is now a credit to the Order, as well as a striking example of the more than ordinary business ability and talent for building-up so conspicuously displayed by Mr. O'Shea in his official capacity as Grand Secretary and Treasurer of the Brotherhood. Mr. O'Shea has a pen that talks, and the *Journal's* editorials are trenchant and incisive, treating of questions vitally interesting to brakemen as a class, and dealing telling blows at abuses and those who uphold them. Aside from its special interest to railroad men, there is much of general interest in the *Journal*, making it a very readable Magazine. The subscription list, already large, is "on the boom," and bids fair to grow to mammoth proportions.

(Monthly) published by the Presbyterian Society. Its special field is the advancement of the interests of the Church. Interesting articles upon timely topics of religious interest, from the pen of the Pastor and other devoted workers, appear in every issue. The paper has proved a valuable auxiliary in church work.

### COLLEGE CITY STREET RAILWAY.

The construction of the line of street railway began in May, 1885, and during the year upwards of three miles of track were laid and the line opened to the public. Since that time various extensions of the lines within the city have been made, including an eastward extension to the popular resort known as "Highland Park." Since this line was opened it has been a great benefit to citizens living along the route, and is proving a decidedly useful adjunct to the "boom." 

### BROTHERHOOD OF RAILROAD BRAKEMEN.

The Brotherhood of Railroad Brakemen, as its name implies, is composed of men who are, or have been engaged in active service as brakemen on the various railroads of this country, although many of them are now holding more responsible and lucrative positions in and out of the service. The Brotherhood was organized in the beautiful village of Oneonta, New York, September 23d, 1883, by eight brakemen employed on the Albany & Susquehanna Railroad. The aims and objects of the Order are set forth in the following preamble:

To unite the Railroad Brakemen; to promote their general welfare and advance their interests—social, moral and intellectual; to protect their families by the exercise of a systematic benevolence, very needful in a calling so hazardous as ours, this fraternity has been organized.

Persuaded that it is for the interests both of our members and their employers, that a good understanding should at all times exist between the two, it will be the constant endeavor of this organization to establish mutual confidence, and create and maintain harmonious relations.

Such are the aims and such the purposes of the Brotherhood of Railroad Brakemen.

It will be seen that the Brotherhood is not only a benefit but an actual

necessity, and although scarcely four years old, the good it has already accomplished can never be computed.

During its brief existence it has paid out in claims to the families of dead and disabled members nearly \$300,000, and has done more toward eradicating the evil of intemperance among railroad men than all the so-called temperance societies combined. Intemperance is not tolerated, and a man's moral, mental and physical record is carefully considered before he is admitted. By a strict adherence to this rule the Brotherhood has been enabled to select only the better class of men and has materially improved the service, which fact is acknowledged and the Brotherhood endorsed by railroad managers everywhere. Benevolence, Sobriety and Industry is the motto of the Brotherhood, which already numbers 250 lodges and 10,000 members.

It is opposed to strikes and favors arbitration as a means of settling any difficulty or misunderstanding that may arise with railway companies. It is not in any way connected, controlled or influenced by any other organization, and has nothing to do with religion or politics.

Although young in years the Brotherhood has encountered many difficulties and back-sets, some of which shook it to its very foundation and for a time threatened to cause the downfall of the organization. But hard work and honesty of purpose, coupled with perseverance and determination on the part of the officers, overcame all obstacles and placed the Brotherhood safely in the front ranks of railway organizations.

The Grand Lodge was moved from Oneonta, N. Y., to Chicago, Ill., in January, 1885, and was removed to this city the following December.

The general offices of the Brotherhood are located in the Union Hotel block, with Mr. Ed. F. O'Shea, Grand Secretary and Treasurer, in charge. Mr. O'Shea is also editor and manager of the *Railroad Broker's Journal*, the official organ of the Brotherhood. It is published monthly in this city and circulates in every important railway city in North America. Its present circulation is eight thousand copies, and it is a source of revenue to the Brotherhood.

Employed in the general offices as assistants are Messrs. W. A. Sheahan, P. H. Morrissey and James Fitzgerald. These gentlemen came here with the Brotherhood and are now worthy citizens of Galesburg.

Grand Master S. E. Wilkinson is a resident of Peoria, Ill., and Grand Organizer L. C. Foster, Jr., is a native of New York. Both of these gentlemen travel in the interest of the order and make this city their headquarters. The Brotherhood does an immense business with the post-office,

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banks and express companies, and their business is constantly increasing. At the death of a member \$800 is paid to his family or friends, and if a member becomes totally disabled and unfit to perform his duties, his claim is treated as a death claim and the same amount is paid to him. The policies already written aggregate \$8,000,000.00. The Brotherhood pays all legal claims promptly and cheerfully and has never had a law-suit.


The death rate among railroad brakemen is greater than any other class of men in the world. Statistics show that four brakemen are killed every day and ten men are injured every hour. This terrible slaughter could be decreased fully 75 per cent if railway companies were compelled to equip their freight trains with automatic brakes and couplers. The Brotherhood is doing much in this direction and it is confidently hoped that its efforts will be crowned with success.

### COVENANT MUTUAL BENEFIT ASSOCIATION.

Among the many institutions that have given Galesburg fame abroad, none have made the name more widely known, or contributed a larger share to the enterprise and business interests of this city than the Covenant Mutual Benefit Association. This association, which is peculiarly one of the belongings of Galesburg, has during the past five years given our city a reputation in the insurance world second to none in the West; and through the efforts and untiring perseverance of its originators it has become one of the prominent landmarks in its future progress to which our people must refer with pride. The design of the association was and is to furnish to Odd Fellows and their families a system of insurance, within their financial reach, yet a safe and certain provision for the family against sickness, disaster and the unforeseen reverses of fortune, and its success in this new field has long since placed it at the head of the list of all kindred associations. Organized January 9th, 1877, with no capital except that of character and simplicity, cheapness and durability of its plan, it has increased in strength, influence and usefulness until on June 1st, 1887, it numbers *twenty-six thousand two hundred and eighty-five members*, and has paid to the widows and orphans of deceased members more than *two millions* of dollars, and has now a reserve fund of \$175,000, in U. S. registered bonds, besides \$75,000 of other available assets. The extent and magnitude of the business performed by this association is indicated by the over \$76,000,000 at risk, and the faithfulness with which the trust thus created is being fulfilled is shown by the munificent sum of over \$2,000,000 already collected and paid to the beneficia-

ries of its deceased patrons at an average cost of less than \$7.20 per \$1,000 insurance.

But very few, if any, not connected with the association can form any correct judgment as to the vast amount of labor necessary to the proper transaction of its present business, requiring, as it does, the services of many special and district agents and a corps of some twenty-five employes

and clerks in the office alone. The business transacted through the Galesburg post office is nearly one-third of the entire business done. In 1886 this association mailed 425,208 letters and packages, the postage on which amounted to \$6,302.71. Of that number, nearly 200,000 contained return envelopes, making an aggregate of between six and seven hundred

thousand packages that yearly go through the post office through the medium of this association. This large business was the means of securing to Galesburg the free delivery of mails. The association has extended its field of operation through all the Northern States, Canada and Manitoba, and is now receiving over six hundred applications per month.

Owing to the large increase of membership, the offices on the corner of Simmons and Prairie streets proved too limited for the transaction of its business, and to the management belongs a large share of the credit of setting on foot a plan, which with the co-operation of the Odd Fellows of this city led to the erection of the handsome building on the corner of Main and Kellogg streets, the second story of which is occupied as the home offices of the association.

While a visitor to the rooms of the C. M. B. A. will find the machinery of the office all working smoothly and harmoniously, yet very few can appreciate the great amount of labor necessary to organize, equip, and build the association up to its present magnitude, requiring, as it has and does, an extraordinary executive ability and foresight in the management of its complex duties. The greater portion of this responsibility has fallen upon the shoulders of its able and efficient Secretary and General Manager, Col. E. F. Phelps, who for more than ten years has made the success and permanency of the "Covenant Mutual" his constant study, and aided by the President, Hon. A. W. Berggren, and other earnest co-laborers has united in its plan every element to cause the association to fulfill a high destiny, and the result of these labors will ever be to him, his associates and the brotherhood at large a just cause of pride.

Faithful to its great trusts in the past, so shall the Odd Fellows of future generations continue to rejoice in the beneficence of the "Covenant."

#### THE GALESBURG CLUB.

The Galesburg Club was organized March 16, 1885, is incorporated under the laws of the State of Illinois, and has at this writing a membership of two hundred and twenty-five, including many of our largest and most enterprising business men and citizens. As stated in the Constitution, "The primary object of the Club shall be to promote the business interests of the city of Galesburg, and the social enjoyment of the members of the corporation." The spacious apartments of the club, which include reception, reading, billiard, card, consultation, cloak and toilet



rooms, are located at Nos. 20, 22 and 24 South Prairie street, and have been most elaborately and tastily decorated and furnished at an expense of nearly three thousand dollars. The Club rooms are open to members every week day from nine a. m. to twelve p. m., and on Sunday from twelve m. until six p. m. Visitors, not residents of the city, are admitted only on invitation of a member, while citizens, not members of the Club, are only admitted on invitation of the House Committee. This enterprise is but another of the many evidences of renewed life and activity noticeable on all sides, and we trust and believe, from the high standing and substantial character of the officers and members of the Club, much permanent good will come from it to our beautiful city. #### THE SCANDINAVIAN MUTUAL AID ASSOCIATION.

This Association was organized by our Swedish-American citizens of this city, and incorporated under the laws of the State of Illinois Sept. 12th, 1883, and commenced business on the 26th of October following.

It is organized for the purpose of affording a reliable life insurance to its members upon the assessment plan at a minimum cost to the insured, and that it has been successful in this is attested by the following facts and figures: On the first day of June, 1887, the Association numbered 3600 members in good standing, and had paid to beneficiaries of deceased members since organization, \$55,000; and this has been accomplished for the sum of \$20.30 on each \$1000 insurance for persons forty years of age who have been members since the beginning of business, making an average yearly cost of \$5.80 for every \$1000 insurance at age of forty.

During the last two years the Association has paid every loss in full according to the face of the Membership Certificate, and in addition thereto has a reserve fund of \$3600, which was commenced only a year ago and is now being regularly augmented by adding 10 per cent of all assessments thereto.

The headquarters of the Association are upstairs over the Galesburg National Bank. The present officers and board of directors are as follows, each officer having served continuously since organization: President, S. P. A. Lindahl; Vice President, N. J. Oleen; Secretary, Nels Nelson; Treasurer, Jonas A. Johnson; Medical Director, Dr. J. T. Wilson. Directors—S. P. A. Lindahl, C. G. Thulin, Moline; G. A. Bohman, Chicago; John A. Oberg, N. J. Oleen, Jonas A. Johnson, Chas. A. Peterson, Nels Nelson. These gentlemen are all prominent citizens, whose standing in the community is of the highest, and their character unassailable. The brilliant showing made by this company with a record of less than four years is something remarkable even in the history of co-operative insurance, a system which has abundantly demonstrated its right to be, and is without doubt destined to entirely revolutionize the science of life assurance. Mr. Nelson, the efficient Secretary, is a gentleman of more than ordinary ability, possessing to the fullest extent the confidence not only of our Swedish-American fellow-citizens but of all classes in the community. Some years since he was honored by election to the responsible office of City Treasurer, a position which he held for several terms, finally giving up the office on account of poor health, which became impaired from service under the flag of his adopted country. To him largely belongs the credit of the present standing of the Scandinavian Mutual, whose methods and management are a guarantee of continued success.

NOTE.—For the purpose of numbering, the City is divided North and South by Main Street, and East and West by Broad Street. All Streets running North and South take the prefix NORTH on all Street Signs North of Main Street, but have no prefix South of Main Street. In the same manner, all Streets intersecting Broad Street take the prefix WEST on all Street Signs West of Broad, but have no prefix East of that Street. In this Directory, however, the prefixes EAST, WEST, NORTH and SOUTH have been used to prevent possible misapprehension. The numbering of the Streets begins at the base line on Broad or Main Street, and each Block is assigned 100 Numbers, the second Block running from 100 to 200, the third to 300, and so on. By this plan, the number of a house being given, it is easy to calculate its distance from the dividing line in either direction.
