




At the days of the Used-to-Be.




I want to go back at the close of day,

To the Alumni of G. H. S., who share with us our golden memories of high school days, we, the Senior Class, dedicate this, the 1925 Reflector.









Of course, the other classes also have fine students but we think that the third year class leads in the friendly spirit. Our load is bettee with the thought of supporting and juspiring the other students in our school.







The fund for the State Library has continued to be replenished this year, thus making our year not merely one of a social, literary aspect, but one of true benefit as well.







Then we entertained our mothers at a tea and gave a play and storts to show off our talents.


Our last social function was our annual senior banquel. Many of the old members returned and the seniors were given farewell messages and gifts. As usual the homotet was the crowning glury of the year.

Then the Protoramas, satisfied with their selections, left the shop in High-School-Land and returned to their own homes, until another successful year should come.









The T. R. club's debate team deserves a great deal of credit, and we hope now, since it has made such a fine beginning, that it will make debating one of the main objectives of the clab.



The result was a tie in all the schools. Alleen won first here; llosanna second, and Marie third. In Mongrouth, Mary won second and Leone third.



We are proud of the work our orchestra is doing, and of Mr. Landon's able, interested leadurship.




The Glee Club


The committee controls all activities of the student body as a whole. As elects the editors and business managers of the two publications.

Dear Editor,






Two Mile Relay Team
