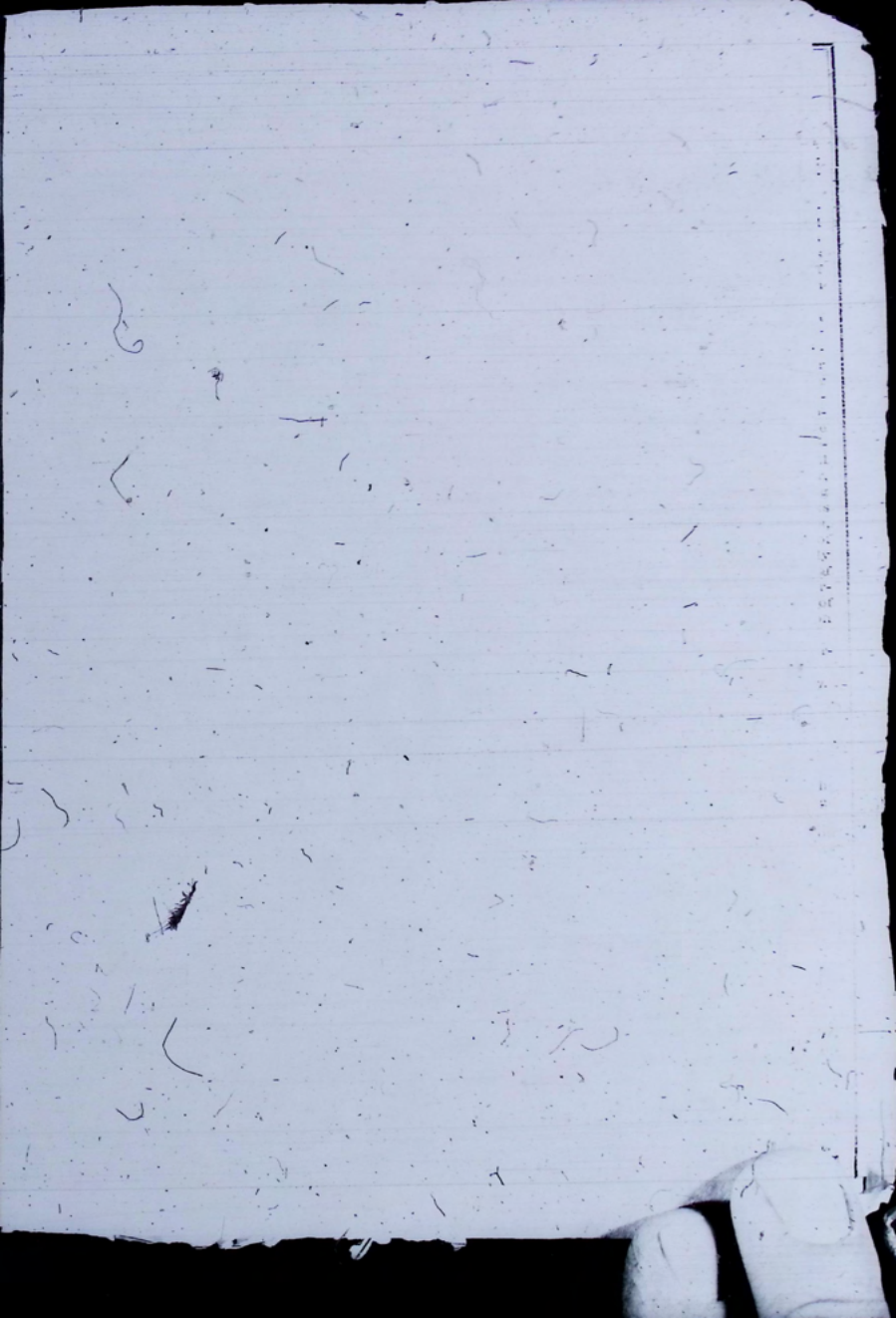

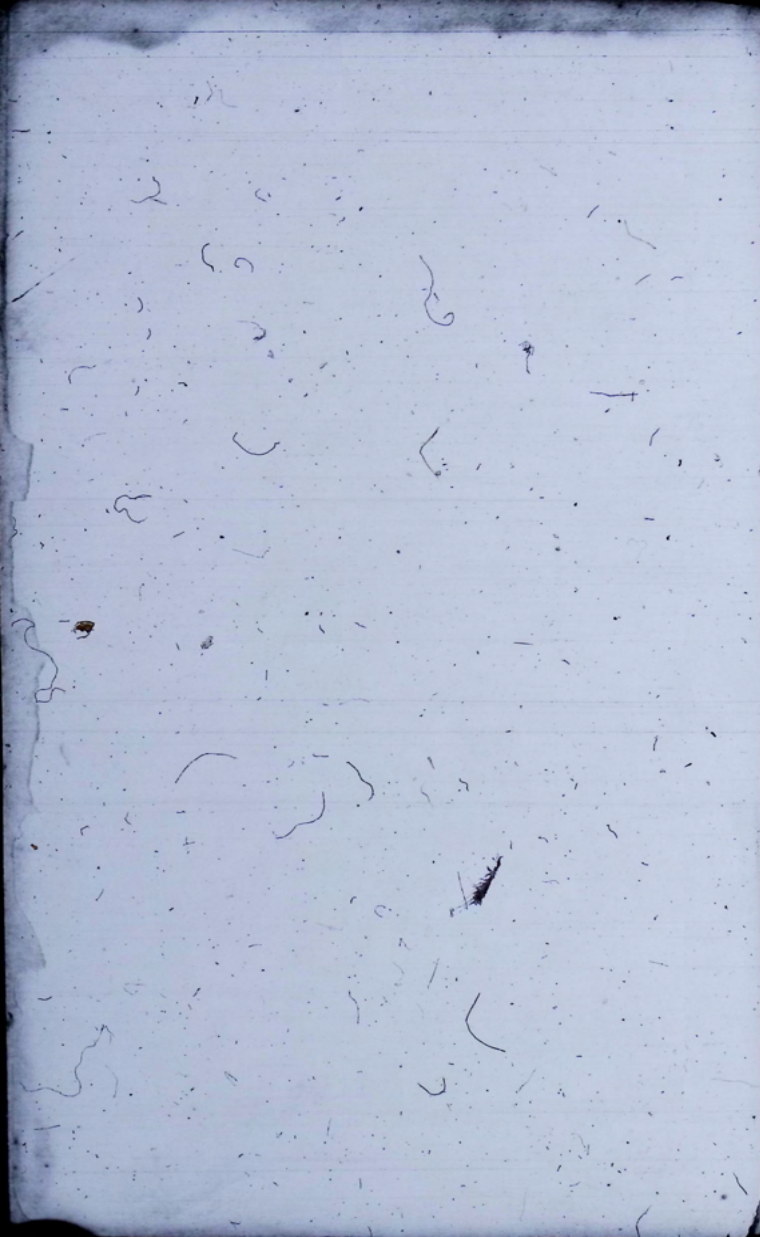

HISTORICAL SKETCH.

Galesburg is a flourishing city of about ten thousand inhabitants. It is situated in a beautiful and healthful section of country known as the "Military Tract," and is about midway between the Mississippi and Illinois rivers, and at the junction of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, and the Peoria & Oquawka Railroads. It is about 170 miles South and West from Chicago; 100 miles North and East from Quincy, and almost 45 miles each from Peoria and Burlington. The first settlement was made in 1836, by a colony, mainly from Oneida County in the State of New York. Their object was the advancement of education and religion at the West, shrewdly interwoven with plans for worldly advancement and profit. The hardships and sacrifices of a new country were endured with fortitude and cheerfulness, trusting in Him who made the earth to be inhabited. This colony was strongly anti-slavery, which character has been well sustained to the present time, thus preparing the way for their patriotic and efficient efforts in various ways for the great Rebellion caused by slavery. It was thoroughly devoted to the cause of Temperance, and to the present time this community has been distinguished for its high toned temperance character. It was also opposed to the spread of Roman Catholicism in the Mississippi Valley, as it feared the power and spirit of that Church against Protestantism and the Republic.

Its advancement for many years was slow and steady, but in 1854 the Chicago & Burlington Railroad was completed to this place, and gave it new life and energy and brighter prospects, that since have been more than realized. The city was not chartered until 1857, having then a population of over 5,000.

Its success has been beyond the most sanguine hopes of its early founders, until it has now become one of the most enterprising and best points in the State, for education, for business,

and for social and religious life; while all sections of the country are contributing to its population and its capital, and this year about 300 new buildings will be erected at an expense of over half a million of dollars.

Kn~~ox~~ College is situated here and is presided over by Rev. Dr. Curtis, assisted by thirteen professors and teachers. It has upon its catalogue the names of 268 students. There is in connection with this institution a Female Seminary, under the charge of Miss Howard, and now having about 60 students.

In the various College and Society Libraries there are over 5,000 volumes, and in the Mineralogical and Geological cabinets about 1,200 specimens. The endowment of these institutions and the real and personal property belonging to them amount to over *three hundred thousand dollars*—mainly the result of the wisdom of the early founders, in connection with the Railroad interests developed here, though generous donations were made by men of large minds and benevolence for the advancement of sound learning and religion in the West.

Lombard University (Universalist) is located here, and is under the charge of Rev. Dr. Weston, assisted by six professors and teachers, and has upon its catalogue the names of 242 students. It is named in honor of Benjamin Lombard, Esq. who generously contributed it the sum of \$20,000. It has a good library. Besides its buildings and lands it has recently secured an endowment of *one hundred thousand dollars*.

The common schools are in an excellent condition. The graded school system has been adopted and is a success. For the higher departments the city has just completed a large and commodious building at an expense of over \$60,000. It is capable of seating 750 pupils, and is perhaps the best arranged and finished structure of the kind in the State.

There are fifteen churches here, having a membership of almost 3,500, and church edifices costing in all over \$150,000. There is in them a strong and healthy religious growth, uniting the New England character with the energy and activity of the West, and their Pastors are some of the most able and eloquent men of the land.

There is a Young Men's Library Association here, having about 3,000 well selected volumes, much read.

Through the Post-Office over 2,000 regular newspapers are received weekly, and through news agents about 1,200 papers and magazines.

There are three newspapers published here; one has a steam press, and all a large and increasing circulation.

The business interests have been very successful. They are sound and healthy and very promising for the future. The amount now done, in the way of trade, is not far from *four millions of dollars*.

There are in the city about 70 stores, of various kinds, doing a business of nearly two and a quarter millions of dollars.

In stock and produce the business is over a million and a half. Two National Banks are established here, having a capital of \$250,000, and deposit of about \$320,000. A rich spot in a green field.

There are three Flouring Mills here, worth about \$60,000, and doing a business of about \$300,000.

Two Foundries having a capital of \$150,000 and a business of \$250,000 and employing a large number of men.

Two Manufactories of Corn Planters, one doing a business of \$175,000 and giving employment to 90 men. It has a capital of \$100,000.

The "Hemp Works" do about \$150,000 worth of business, and employ 25 men.

The lumber business is about \$200,000 per annum; all the estimates being by the year, unless otherwise mentioned.

Four Hotels having a business of over \$75,000.

The Meat Markets about \$115,000.

There are many other thriving interests of importance here, that space will not permit us to mention.

RAILROADS.

The Railroads are very important to this city. There are about 400 miles in the different roads meeting at this point, and another of some 40 miles, it is hoped will soon be realized, connecting this city with Rock Island and that region of country. The C. B. & Q. now owns all the roads connected with this place. Their real and personal property within the city is worth about \$300,000. The business of the roads at this point, in the various departments is about \$60,000 per month, or \$720,000 per

annum. Important shops connected with the roads are established here, and in them are employed some 350 men, and on the trains about 150. The stock of the C. B. & Q. is among the best in the United States.

There are two Express offices at this place, each doing several thousand dollars worth of business.

The Telegraph Company is doing a large business and pays for salaries at this place over \$800 per month.

The Post-Office is doing a business of about \$14,000 per annum, and is perhaps the third office in the State.

The Gass Works, recently erected at an expense of about \$90,000, throw a beautiful light over all.

During the Great Rebellion 1,200 men enlisted here for the army, and over \$100,000 were paid for bounties and for the aid of soldiers and their families.

The Bible says, "Seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added." This colony was commenced in the fear of the Lord and in reliance upon His teachings, and the above will show something of what has been added in fulfillment of this promise.

INSTITUTIONS.

Knox College.

This Institution is situated near the center of the city in a park of twenty-six acres, ornamented with about 3,000 fruit and evergreen trees. Its main edifice is a stately building, costing \$45,000. On either side of it stands East College and Williston Hall, furnishing dormitories for about 60 students, and rooms for the two Library Societies. Surrounding these buildings lie about 17 acres of ground devoted to recreation. By the addition of vines, and shrubs, and flowering plants, it is designed to make these grounds increasingly attractive from year to year, and contribute to the cultivation of the student.

THE MAIN COLLEGE EDIFICE contains chapel, recitation and lecture rooms, cabinet, laboratory, and three libraries. The College library has over 3,000 well selected volumes. And each of the Literary Societies have over 1,000 volumes of the best recent publications. These libraries are accessible to all students, both in the Collegiate and Preparatory Departments.

The Mineralogical Cabinet contains about 500 specimens; the Geological 600. To these Libraries and Cabinets constant additions are being made.

The design is soon to erect another large building west of the present ones, and in a line with them, for the accommodation of the Preparatory Department, to furnish additional dormitories for the increasing number of students, a laboratory room, and it is hoped halls for the Literary Societies whose rooms are now "too strait" for them.

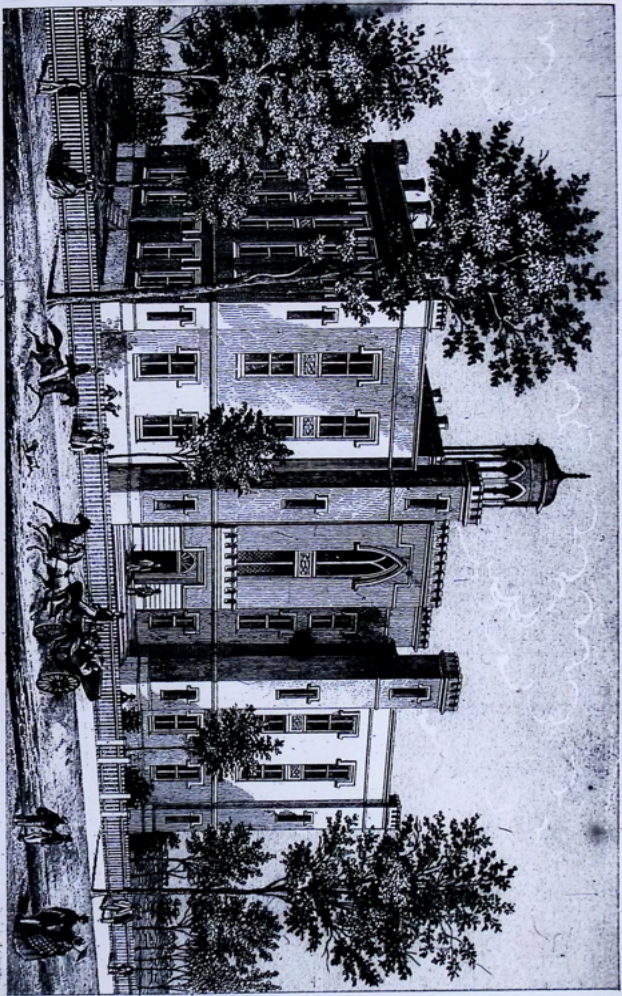
The College Course of study occupies four years, and corresponds with the undergraduate course in the oldest and best Colleges in the country. Twenty-two classes have been graduated. A Scientific Course, also, has been opened for those whose age or circumstances will not admit of their taking the full course. Their course occupies three years, and comprises the entire College Course with the exception of Greek and Latin. Students contemplating this course are entitled to the degree of Bachelor of Science.

THE ACADEMICAL DEPARTMENT, has two courses of study, Classical and English. The first prepares the student for college. The second, is a full course of English studies, and affords special advantages to those who design to become teachers.

Tuition is reduced to the lowest consistent amount, which may still be reduced 25 per cent. by the purchase of a scholarship. Tuition is given free to wounded soldiers. In certain cases of indigent and promising students, tuition may be remitted entirely on recommendation of the Faculty. The design is to bring the advantages of the Institution within the reach of all.

THE COLLEGE YEAR consists of 40 weeks, commencing the first Thursday in September, and ending the 25th of June; and is divided into three terms of unequal length, giving a recess of two weeks for the holidays of Christmas and New Years. The regular annual commencement is in the last week of June.

While it is not designed at all to make the Institution denominational, it is designed to have it under the influence of *decidedly* *Evangelical* Christian Religion.

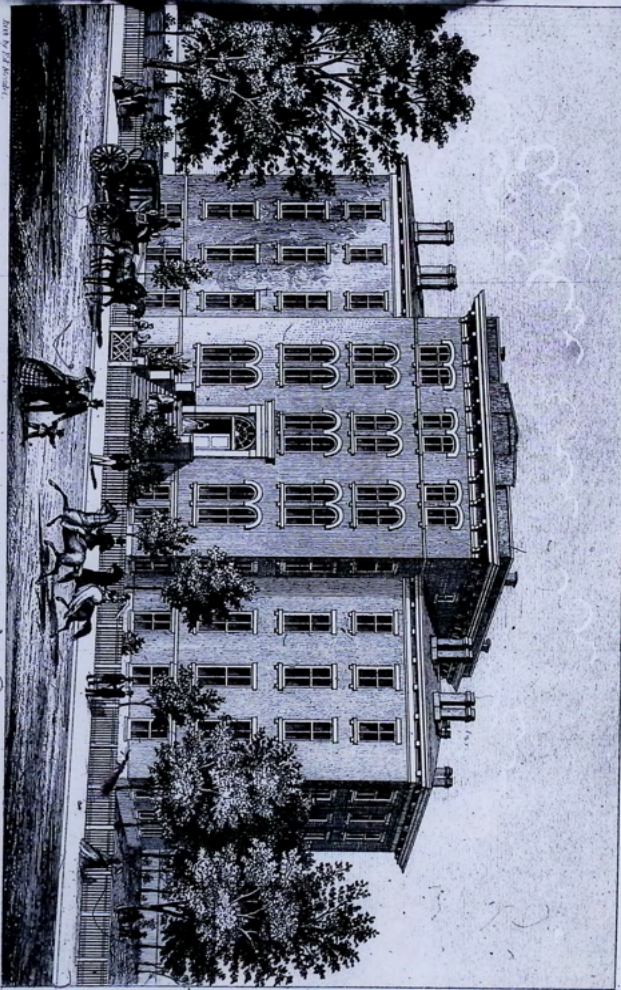

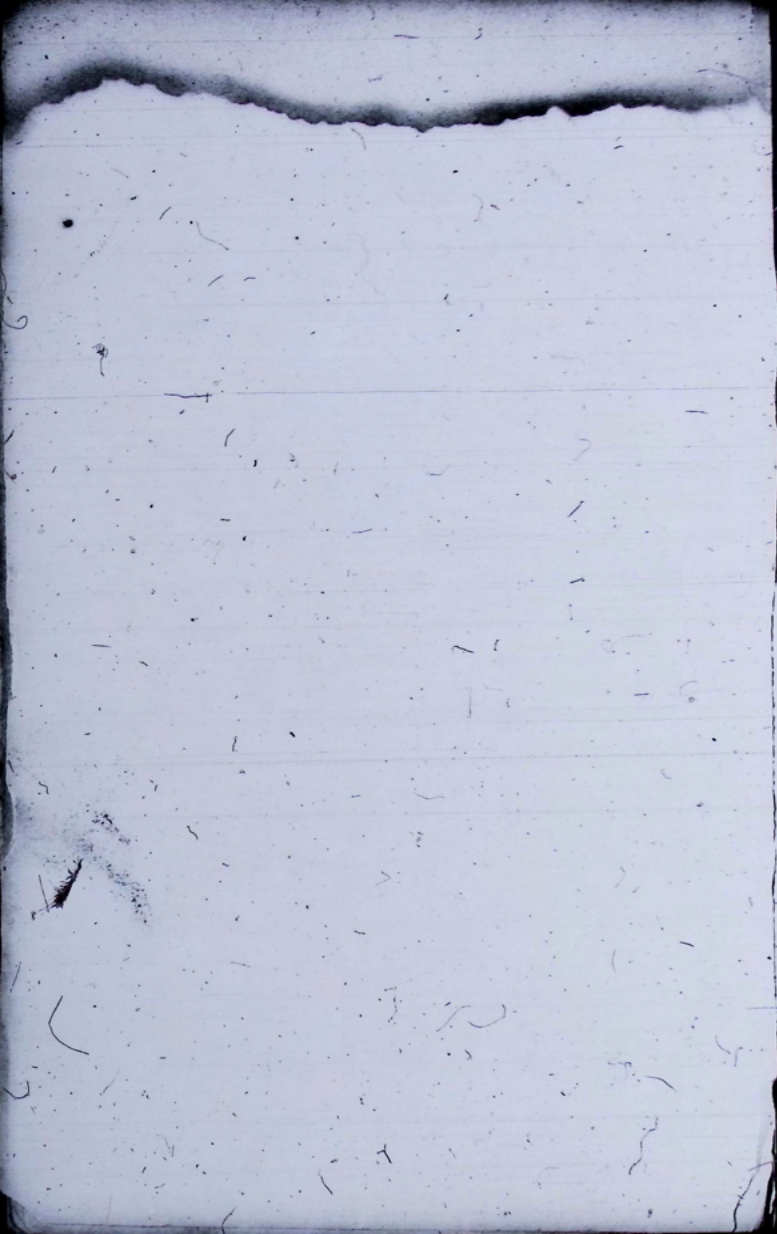

The Trustees, in answer to an urgent call for such an arrangement, have also established a Preparatory Department in the Seminary, where students are prepared for the regular course, and enjoy all the privileges of the Seminary Family. In short, the family and school are so organized that they form constituents parts of the same whole, each advancing the interests of the other, and both uniting to promote the improvement, comfort and happiness of the household.

Parents may unhesitatingly trust their daughters to the care of the Principal, assured that in respect to all their associations they will be within the safe enclosure of a Christian home. Miss Howard is a graduate of Mt. Holyoke Seminary, and was for several years a teacher in that Institution; also, in the Houghton Seminary, Clinton, N. Y., and in the Western Seminary, Oxford, Ohio. Miss Munsell—in the classroom—has few, if any, superiors. In Miss Robinson we have one who possesses a very rare combination of talent, and has had an experience in teaching of fifteen years. She has a thorough acquaintance with the French language, and converses with equal ease in French and English. Her success in teaching may well be a strong inducement to those who seek high qualifications in either branch of a musical education. Mrs. Colby is not only an artist herself, but has shown marked ability in bringing forward her pupils. Mrs. McCall is a graduate of Mt. Holyoke, and Mr. Hayt's has long enjoyed the confidence of our community as a Professor of Penmanship. The ability and experience of President Curtis, and of Professors Hurd and Hitchcock, are too well known to need comment.

Lombard University

This Institution is located in Galesburg, Knox Co., Ill., and was first chartered under the name of the "Illinois Liberal Institute," Feb. 15th, 1851. It was opened for instruction August 29th, 1852. It became a College by charter amendment Jan. 26th, 1853. The Institute building was burned April 27th, 1855. The present University building, a Gothic edifice, three stories high, 80 feet long and 66 feet wide, was erected in 1856, in honor of Benjamin Lombard, who had made a large donation to the College; it was by the amendment of its charter, approved Feb. 14th, 1857, named "Lombard University." It was established by the exertions and contributions of persons of liberal religious sentiments; mostly by Universalists. Since its opening, it has been sustained as a liberal school, untrammelled by narrow sectarian dogmas; yet, those controlling it, have endeavored, and with eminent success, to cause it to exert a highly moral and truly religious influence. All its departments are open to pupils of either sex. It affords superior opportunities for instruction in the common and higher branches, including the practical and ornamental studies, taught in Academies, Seminaries and Colleges. The instruction throughout is thorough, and the collegiate courses, of which there are three, are as complete as in any of the old Colleges in the East. Its teachers are among the most laborious and successful in the country. It has a good Library, a fine Cabinet and extensive apparatus. It has been largely patronized, having yearly from two hundred to three hundred students. It deserves and should have a much larger patronage. The expenses of the University have heretofore been defrayed by tuition fees, never high, and by using the interest and principle of an inadequate "Scholarship Fund." The Institution is now free from debt, and has lately been endowed with the sum of one hundred thousand dollars. This sum when invested and made productive, will enable the University to rank high as a literary institution of the land, and receive, as it justly deserves, a large and increasing amount of patronage.

There are many other advantages of Life Insurance, besides the security of a family against want. Creditors can insure the lives of their debtors as a security for their claims. A young man may borrow money to complete his education, or may obtain credit for a stock of goods, or tools, or a farm, by insuring his life and assigning the policy as contingent security. A parish may relieve their clergyman from anxious care by raising a small sum to insure his life, and thus provide for his family. In short, Life Insurance is applicable to all purposes for raising money on loans, where only personal security can be offered; and, generally, as affording means of certain indemnity against any pecuniary loss, claim, or inconvenience whatsoever, to which one individual may become subject, by reason of the death of another.

The moral and social influence of Life Insurance is a great benefit both to the individual and to the community. It develops the amiable and generous traits of character, accustoms a man to think for others, induces habits of industry, economy and accumulation, and, by relieving the mind from anxiety and over exertion, promotes health and longevity. A systematic adoption of Life Insurance, by the people of any country, would do more to eradicate pauperism and crime than all the combined wisdom of its legislators; so that a well-founded, well-conducted institution of this description is a subject of public interest, as its beneficial effects are at least equal to those of any charitable, philanthropical public institution; and these effects are produced without any donation, sacrifice, or act of beneficence by the public or by individuals, being the natural and easy result of the spontaneous thrift, prudence, and forethought of individuals in conducting their own concerns.

Of 500 persons, only one lives eighty years, and of 100 only six live sixty-five years. Those who can cheat themselves into the belief that they run no risk of dying, will not, of course, insure. No one, however, need consult books to learn lessons of mortality. 'Tis the burden of pulpit eloquence; the lesson of the grave-yard; and the teaching of every day's experience. The uncertainty of life being admitted, it will follow that accumulation upon the Savings Bank principle, does not meet the requirements of the case.

Suppose a husband and father aged thirty-three years, deposits in a Savings Bank and an Insurance Company, each, \$125, per annum,

Should death occur in the first year, there would be secured in the Savings Bank, \$125, in the Insurance Company, \$5,040.40. While the average amount for the time in Bank, \$3,092.02, average in the Insurance Company, \$6,233.15.

It will be seen from this illustration that after the first five years the amount added to the policy by dividends considerably EXCEEDS the total amount of premium paid on the original policy.

KINDS OF POLICIES.

COMMON LIFE POLICIES.

These bind the Company to insure the party for the whole term of life on receipt of a stipulated premium, to be paid yearly, semi-annually or quarterly during life; they participate in dividends, and the dividends will be applied to increase the amount of the policy, or to reduce future premiums.

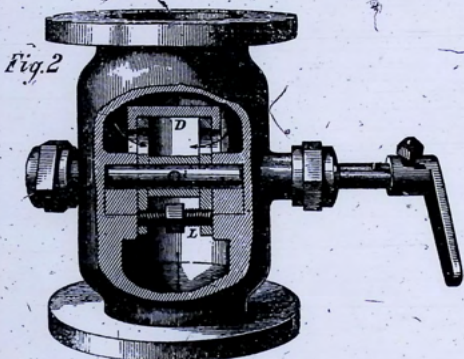
