HISTORICAL AND BUSINESS REVIEW.

ITS PROGRESS AND PROSPECTS.

Galesburg is situated on the height of the water shed between the Mississippi and Illinois rivers at that point on the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad, where the Burlington and Peoria branches leave the main trunk, and is by rail about 165 miles s. s. w. from Chicago, 100 miles n. n. e. from Quincy, 53 miles w. n. w. from Peoria, 43 miles e. n. e. from Burlington, thus making it the great railroad centre for over four hundred miles of road. It is in the midst of the finest agricultural country, upon the broad surface of the globe. For miles upon either side stretch vast expanse of beautiful prairie whose gentle undulating swells remind a beholder of the Pacific, when not lashed by angry winds into tumultuous waves. These broad prairies, now wrested from the wild dominion of nature, have lost none of their picturesque loveliness. Hardy sons of toil who have

"Crossed the prairies as of old
The pilgrims crossed the sea,
To make the West as they the East,
The homestead of the free."

Have, instead of detracting from the natural beauties, added to them, and now well cultivated fields greet the eye upon every hand. There is an impress of—not age, but development—everywhere visible, and yet the vast resources of the surrounding country have scarcely been brought to light. This development is in its incipency. The soil is fertile and capable of supporting three-fold its present population, and yet have enough and to spare. The vast stratas of coal underlying the surrounding country are inexhaustible, and can afford fuel for countless manufacturing establishments.

In 1836, through the influence of and in accordance with the long cherished plans of Rev. Dr. George W. Gale, of establishing institutions of learning in the West, a tract of land was purchased in Knox county, containing eleven thousand acres. A town site was laid out in the centre of the tract, and the lots and farm lands so appraised as to repay the original cost and leave a surplus of about \$40,000, which was to

form and be used as an endowment for a college. With such a prospect, it was no matter of surprise that the embryo city of Galesburg prospered from the outset. There was attached to it a permanency which other towns did not possess. At that time the spirit of speculation was rife. A mania had seized upon the people, and almost every one, whether high or low, rich or poor, learned or unlearned, was drawn into the great maelstrom of speculation, whether of stocks or real estate—a maelstrom whose shores were and are yet strewn with the wrecks of the wealth of tens of thousands hapless voyagers,—men to whom the voyage of life seemed like sailing upon summer seas, with none but favoring breezes to waft their barques to a haven of wealth and quiet. When the rude shock had passed, those towns whose foundations and superstructure were “speculation,” almost or quite ceased to exist, save upon paper, or in the imaginative minds of a few hopeful speculators. But Galesburg, with “educational advantages” as its corner stone, survived the crisis, and steadily grew.

The early history of the town is also that of Knox College, as the founding of one gave rise to the other, and for a number of years the growth of the town,—in effect—depended upon the continuing cause—the college. In the autumn of 1837, the first buildings were erected and the school opened, and for the following thirteen years but little occurred to disturb the even tenor of the town's existence. In 1850, however, a great tidal wave of railway enterprise and speculation swept over this section of country, which, so far as Galesburg is concerned, culminated in securing its four radial lines of railway, making the future of the city no longer problematical, and infusing new life and vigor into transactions of every kind. Real estate in and near the town rapidly appreciated in value, and Knox College, as the recipient of much of this increase, witnessed its endowment expand from \$40,000 to more than a quarter of a million.

The year 1851 marks another eventful era in the history of Galesburg. Still mindful of its literary birth, and desirous of making a “seat of learning” of the town, the friends of liberal education inaugurated a second institution here, known as Lombard University, under the auspices of the Universalist denomination. Mr. Benjamin Lombard, Sr., of Chicago, donated land for its site, valued at \$20,000, and in return the institution adopted the name of its generous friend.

In 1857 another incident marks the career of the young and growing town. At that time it became an incorporated city, with a clause in its charter allowing the people by vote at the first election, to license or prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors within its limits. This was carried by a vote of three to one, and until within a few years past, remained strictly in force.

The establishment of the railway machine shops, an interest whose immense dimensions but few in the city realize, as also the founding of other large manufacturing interests here, have left their impress upon the past and present, and are still working out the destiny of Galesburg. In another place we shall refer to these establishments at considerable

length, as also to the institutions of learning. The streets of Galesburg are laid out at right angles, and for the most part are broad and pleasant.

One of the crowning glories of the city is the profusion of shrubbery everywhere prevalent. Lining the streets and in the door yards, forest and ornamental trees vie with each other in giving a home like appearance, and in the spring and summer there is such a wilderness of foliage as to almost obscure the houses. The streets are well provided with substantial sidewalks, usually kept in good repair, and afford many attractive promenades and drives. The principal business thoroughfare is Main street, which extends east and west across the city. Upon either side of this street are fine business houses and blocks, and many of them of beautiful design and finish. In or near the central portion of the city is one of the public squares. For many years this was an open plaza, upon the four sides of which the business of the town was conducted. It was finally enclosed in octagonal form, and of late years a few almost abortive efforts have been made to improve it. This square or park is on the direct line of Main street, and is susceptible of being made a favorite resort. All that is needed is more shrubbery, and a statue or two—a monument, for instance to the memory of deceased soldiers. Upon the north side of the square, where originally stood the old public school building, has been erected a mammoth brick hotel, four stories high, and furnished throughout with all the modern improvements, supplying a great want long felt in the city. It is the property of a joint stock company, erected at an expense of \$50,000, and promises to prove a profitable investment. The lower story is designed for business purposes, and all the store-rooms we believe have been engaged. Also upon the north side of the square is a fine brick block, occupied by merchants.

Casting our eyes southward from the square, we see at the foot of a broad avenue (Broad street) the fine proportions of Knox College looming up in the distance. As we pass down this street, upon our left hand we see the large but very plain Congregational church building in which Dr. Beecher officiates. Passing beyond the church to the first street crossing at right angles, and turning to the east, we stand in front of the large three-story brick building, known as the female department of Knox College.

Immediately in front of this edifice is another park, of large dimensions, which has received considerable attention. Surrounded by a substantial fence and set out in shrubbery, in summer it is beautiful. Upon the west side of this square, and fronting it, are a number of elegant residences.

Retracing our way to the first street south of Main, and we stand in full view of the graded school building, as handsome an edifice as any in the State devoted to like purposes.

In close proximity to each other and but a short distance from Main street, stand three very fine church edifices, the Baptist, First Presbyterian and Universalist, and also the Episcopal. Any one of these

structures would be a credit and ornament to even much larger cities. They are all of frame, erected at great cost, and capable of seating immense audiences. The walls and ceilings of the Presbyterian, Universalist and Baptist churches are elegantly frescoed, and exhibit a taste in decoration, as refined, as rare. The Swedish church, in the northern part of town, however, surpasses the others in point of rich decoration. It is finished in exquisite taste. The Catholic church, in the south part of town, is also a fine structure. Of church edifices in Galesburg there are fourteen, representing different denominational creeds, and affording the opportunity of almost all forms of worship.

The greater portion of the city, including the colleges, graded schools and manufactories, is south of Main street. To the north, however, there are some extensive mills and manufacturing enterprises, and elegant residences and grounds. The topography of this portion of town has led to its selection as a place of residence by many of our families, and is very far from being devoid of interest to the visitor.

The principal business street after Main is Prairie street, upon which there are some fine business blocks, and others are in contemplation. This street intersects Main at right angles, and has one terminus at the depot of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad.

All of the principal streets are lighted with gas, as also are the stores, a very good quality of gas being manufactured at the works from the soft coal which is found in such quantities throughout this section.

C. B. & Q. R. R.

The Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad is very important to this city. There are over 400 miles in the different roads centering at this point, besides many miles more which it is hoped will soon be realized, connecting Galesburg with Rock Island and other important points in that region of country. The Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad at present owns all the roads connected with this city. Their real estate and personal property within the city is estimated worth about 400 thousand dollars. The business of the roads at this point in the various departments is about 100 thousand dollars per annum. The shops of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad here are of great importance to the city, being very extensive, and giving employment to some 400 men, besides from 150 to 200 on the trains. The stock of the road as well as the track is among the best in the United States, while the officers and other officials are noted for their efficiency and courtesy to the public.

Court Creek Railroad.

All the interests of the city are about to be advanced by the building of this road, which is being pushed forward with vigor. Hitherto all lines of road running through or centering here have belonged to the corporation. The legislature of 1867 granted a charter for a road running from Galesburg to Henry, or some point thereabout on the Illinois river, and west to Nauvoo, or some point at or near the lower rapids of

the Mississippi river. The charter was amended in 1869 so as to authorize subscription to the capital stock of the road by townships, cities and towns. The people are thoroughly aroused on the subject, and though it has been but a few months since the question was revived, funds have been raised to pay for a preliminary survey to the Illinois river. There is the clearest evidence of earnest work given by the movers in this enterprise, and the people along the line will build their road with the utmost ease, and there is no doubt that within twelve months, Galesburg will have an independent outlet to Chicago and the East by the completion of the Court Creek Railroad. The road will run through one of the wealthiest and best portions of the State, and the country is well adapted to its construction. The line will run through Victoria to West Jersey and probably Wyoming. It is yet uncertain whether it will run to Lacon or Henry, on the Illinois river; much will depend upon those places and the intervening towns. Many are urging the superior attractions of Henry on account of its being out of debt and can better aid the road, and also because it is claimed the distance to Chicago via Henry and the Rock Island & Peoria railroad, is less than via Lacon and the Chicago, Alton & St. Louis railroad, and its extension to Lacon, which will be built this season. Again, at Henry there is likely to be a junction with a road directly east to Kankakee. At Wyoming or Toulon, whichever shall be the point of junction, the Court Creek road will make a junction with the Peoria & Rock Island road, now graded, which will be completed the present season. It is believed that some Philadelphia capitalists, among whom is Jay Cooke, are to furnish the money on the bonds of the road to complete it, and that it will pass under the control of the Pennsylvania Central. This will give an eastern outlet and connection at Wyoming. The road will traverse one of the best coal fields in the state in Copley and Victoria townships, Knox county, and will develop an immense mineral wealth. We are told that John I. Bennett, of Galva, Henry county, owns 1200 acres in a body, in the very basin of this coal field, and he is actively co-operating in pushing forward the Court Creek road, with a view to the development of these mineral lands. It is said that Mr. Bennett's land is all underlaid with $4\frac{1}{2}$ feet of the finest quality of bituminous coal, and that passes in Chicago and New York are negotiating with him for an interest, with the view of forming a strong mining company, to throw these coals into the market. The coal is said to crop out in all the ravines, and to be capable of mining at half the usual expense. The coal is noted for its percentage of gas and oil, and its freedom from all impurities, and experience has demonstrated that it is equal to Pennsylvania coal for the manufacture of coke. This fact cannot fail to revolutionize the trade in that commodity, and instead of coke being furnished to the west and northwest at an immense price of freightage, the trade will in the near future be supplied from the Victoria and Copley coal fields. Galesburg being the immediate terminus of the Court Creek road, cannot fail to be benefitted by the con-

stant supply of abundant and superior fuel, and the happiest results must necessarily be the sequence.

Galesburg stands prominent among the cities of the West for her educational facilities. Two of her most noted institutions are the Knox College and Lombard University.

Knox College was founded in 1837, and fully organized as a College in 1841. It had its origin in a plan of Christian benevolence. Half the township of land, now known as Galesburg, was originally purchased by a company formed by Rev. Geo. W. Gale, at Whitesboro', New York, as an endowment for the College. The land was bought at the government price, one dollar and twenty-five cents per acre, and repurchased of the company by its individual members, for their own use, at an average of five dollars an acre. The land remaining unsold, and the cash proceeds, constituted the endowment of the College. The plan proved entirely successful. Nearly four hundred acres of this land, situated near the heart of the city of Galesburg, yet remain unsold. Though the Institution has never been rich in money, and is now in pressing need of funds for its Library, Cabinets and Gymnasium, and for many other necessary uses, yet it has in its real estate, a most valuable property, which only needs to be husbanded wisely, to secure for it, in future years, an ample endowment.

Knox College, in its past history, has experienced some vicissitudes, the chief of which was connected with questions arising during the recent formal separation of the Presbyterian and Congregational denominations. These difficulties have now been happily adjusted. The College, under a Board of Trustees representing various evangelical churches, has adopted a well defined policy, which will be steadily pursued, till it shall reach the position among the leading Colleges of the country, to which its origin and resources entitle it.

It is a cluster of institutions united under one head and one name.

The College proper is modelled upon the plan of the American College—an educational institution, devised by our Fathers especially to meet the needs of American society, which has borne the test of two hundred years of service in the education of our honored and gifted men, in all the departments of life. It is intended to be in the highest degree practical not in the sense that it will fit its students for any particular calling, but in the sense that it will impart that culture and knowledge which are essential as a basis of the highest success in all callings. For this purpose the study of Latin, Greek and Mathematics are specially employed. With these two modern languages, together with the Natural Sciences, and the various studies of Philosophy, Logic, Rhetoric and General History and Literature, are united. The student who thoroughly pursues this course will find himself qualified at his graduation, to enter with success upon the special preparation necessary for the learned professions, or for the practical employment of life, and will prove himself able, by the superior rapidity and accuracy of his mental processes, soon and easily to surpass those who have received only a special education for their special calling. In this institution, there-

fore, the College is the object of chief solicitude and care. It gives its character and name to the cluster of schools about it.

The Scientific School is connected with the College proper. Its course is selected from the studies of the regular College curriculum excluding the Ancient languages, and including the Modern languages, the Mathematics and the Natural Sciences. While no one is advised to take this course in preference to the regular course, yet every facility is given to those who enter upon it, to do thorough and scholarly work, so far as they go. While the Faculty of Instruction would awaken no such delusive expectation as are often encouraged in connection with such a course, they feel, all the more, the necessity of making it as advantageous as possible to those whom either choice or necessity induces to enter upon it.

THE FEMALE SEMINARY.—Parallel with the College course, and as nearly the same as the public demands have hitherto required, is the collegiate course of the Seminary, extending over four years. This course is pursued under the instruction both of the special Seminary Faculty and of the College Faculty, in a separate building and in separate classes, except that in the more advanced studies and lectures of the senior year, the young ladies attend the exercises at the college, in this manner the young ladies have equal advantages with young men in the quality of the instruction given them, while yet they pursue an independent course of study.

The indications of a growing interest in the higher education of young ladies are now such, that a plan is under consideration, which may be adopted by the Trustees at their meeting, by which the young ladies will be enabled to take a course of study fully equivalent to that pursued in the College, and receive, upon its successful completion, the first degree in Arts, as it is now conferred upon the College graduates. This course may be taken in six years, instead of four, to avoid injury to health, and to give time for the cultivation of the Fine Arts, and other accomplishments which are not pursued by young men.

It will be a happy day for the women of our country, and an auspicious one for the nation, when the present brief, irregular, superficial, and too often utterly contemptible style of female education, shall give place to a culture which shall furnish women the same facilities for success in life, and especially for eminence among the toilers in thought, as are now accorded to men.

THE CLASSICAL PREPARATORY SCHOOL.—This department is regarded by the Trustees and Faculty as, in many aspects, the most important under their care. Upon this the College must depend not only for its numbers but for its scholarship. The ambition to establish Universities and Colleges which has resulted in the almost entire absence of good classical Academies at the West, has been the main cause of the slow progress made by Western Colleges. If Knox College can provide such instruction, in this department, that students shall be drawn into it from the English department, as is now beginning to be the fact, and if liberally educated men in this part of the country can be convinced that

they can prepare their sons for College in Knox Academy as thoroughly as at Andover or Easthampton or Exeter, then the great work of making Knox the home of the highest scholarly culture will already in large part be accomplished. The success of the past year, which is the first of special effort in this direction, has been most marked. Classes are now being brought forward which will soon completely change the aspect of scholarship in the College. As the numbers in attendance increase, it is the intention to add to the corps of teachers, while a higher standard of scholarship will be sought each year. In this effort to improve primary academical education, Knox College has a claim upon the countenance and patronage of all the lovers of sound learning at the West. In this department students are prepared for the classical courses both of the College and the Female Seminary.

THE ENGLISH ACADEMY.—This, united with the Classical School, constitutes the department called "The Academy." It is devoted to the usual studies pursued in High Schools. As soon as the necessary buildings can be provided, it is contemplated to add facilities for the special instruction of teachers and for commercial pupils. From this department large numbers are now constantly passing into the classical course. The deficiency of most of those who enter the Academy in the elementary portions of an English education, has led to the introduction of frequent exercises in the correct use of our mother tongue, in which all the students, both Classical and English, are required to participate. The crowded condition of the Public Schools of Galesburg, has led to the admission of younger female pupils, than in former years, for whom separate instruction is provided. In this manner girls at an early age enter upon a uniform course of study, which terminates with their graduation from the highest department of the institution.

LADIES' SEMINARY.

The Female Seminary is designed to furnish a collegiate course of instruction for young ladies.

Candidates for admission are examined in the ordinary English studies, Elementary Algebra, and in the Latin Grammar and Reader.

The course occupies four years, although, in some instances, young ladies who have the requisite health and mental discipline are able to complete it in three years.

Superior facilities are afforded for acquiring a practical, as well as theoretical knowledge of Drawing, Painting, Music and French. The department of music is at present in charge of a lady whose success in teaching in our best Seminaries, both East and West, offers strong inducements to those seeking superior instruction in either Vocal or Instrumental Music. The instruction in French is believed to be of an unusually high order.

The young ladies have the benefit of instruction and lectures from the President and Professors of the College, all the studies of the regular curriculum being under their charge, except the French and those assigned to the Lady Principal. It will be observed, that, according to

this arrangement, the young ladies enjoy precisely the same advantages in instruction, and in the use of the Libraries, Apparatus, and Cabinets of the College, which are provided for the young men. Their instruction in the Seminary course is separate from that of the College classes, except, that in the modern languages, the experimental lectures, and other advanced studies of the Senior Year, classes may be united at the discretion of the Faculty, as is the practice in most of our older colleges.

It is believed that the advantages offered by this plan to young ladies are very unusual, and are such as can be provided only in Seminaries connected with a College, and under the supervision of its Faculty of professional instructors.

The attention of young ladies and their parents is called to the fact that the courses of study in Knox Seminary are continuous, and do not admit of omissions and irregularity of attendance, without the loss of class standing. The injury done to the Seminary and the almost irreparable injury done to the pupil herself, by the interruption of her studies, needs only to be understood, to be most anxiously avoided.

LOMBARD UNIVERSITY.

Lombard University had its origin in the deep religious convictions and zeal of persons, who felt the need of an institution of sound and varied learning, in which the best training of the intellect and the affections should be secured, while the minds of pupils should be left untrammelled by narrow sectarian dogmas. It has been sustained as a liberal, christian school; and while seeking in all its departments to give appropriate instruction and needed discipline, it has endeavored also, to exert a highly moral and truly religious influence.

It was chartered, under the name of the "Illinois Liberal Institute," Feb. 15th, 1851. It was opened for instruction August 29th, 1852. It became a College by charter amendment, Jan. 26th, 1853. The Institute building was burned Sept. 27th, 1855. The present University building, a gothic edifice, three stories high, 80 feet long and 66 feet wide, was erected in 1856. In honor of Benjamin Lombard, who had made a large donation to the institution, it was by the amendment of its charter, approved Feb. 14th, 1857, named Lombard University.

It is accessible by railroad from all parts of the West, being situated near the junction of roads leading to Chicago, Burlington, Quincy, Peoria, and Rushville.

It is the purpose of Lombard University to afford to students of either sex equal opportunities for thorough courses of instruction; and the studies pursued have been arranged:

First, To provide a full Collegiate Course of four years, such as is usually pursued in the best Colleges and Universities in this country.

Second, To accommodate those, to whose circumstances it may be specially adapted, with a Scientific course, of the same length and arranged as to combine with practical knowledge, intellectual culture and discipline.

Third, To provide a Literary Course for those who do not desire to

pursue the regular Classical or Scientific Course of the Institution. It also occupies a period of four years.

Fourth, To afford a thorough preparation for each of the Collegiate courses.

Fifth, To meet the wants of those who are unable to pursue either of the regular courses of the Institution.

It embraces at this time two departments of Instruction—the Collegiate and Preparatory.

The Collegiate includes three courses of instruction of four years each; a full Classical Course, such as is usually pursued in the best Colleges of this country; a Scientific Course; and a Literary Course including more study of Languages and less of Mathematics than the Scientific Course.

The Preparatory Department, under the supervision of a good disciplinarian and teacher, includes the studies required to enter the different courses of the Collegiate Department, and,—in view of a preparation for business and teaching, the various other branches usually taught in Academies and High Schools.

Normal classes are formed every term for the benefit of teachers.

Instruction is given in the Fall Term in Civil Engineering and good opportunities are offered to those wishing to obtain a practical knowledge of this subject.

Those who are not candidates for a Degree may receive instruction in any class which they can profitably enter. Music and other ornamental branches will receive prominent attention.

Students of either sex, of approved character and qualifications, may be admitted to any Department of Instruction, or to any class connected with Lombard University.

The requisitions for admission to the Preparatory Department are an ability to read correctly and fluently, a knowledge of the elements of Geography, and of four of the fundamental rules of Arithmetic.

The Degree of Bachelor of Science is conferred upon those who complete the studies of the Scientific Course.

The Degree of Laureate of Arts is conferred upon those who complete the Literary Course.

Those completing the Classical Course receive the Degree of Bachelor of Arts.

The Degree of Master of Arts is conferred, in course, upon every Bachelor of Arts of three years standing, who may have sustained in the mean time, a good moral character.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Galesburg has taken a position in public school matters gratifying to every lover of education: Our public school system has probably done quite as much as the colleges in attracting families here, and we speak of them with pride.

In addition to the High School there are Ward Schools located in the various wards of the city, thereby affording every convenience possible to the children, and yet all of them centralizing on the High School. It affords every advantage a parent could reasonably ask for his child, and to graduate is no slight honor.

Prior to 1856 there were eight independent school districts, each with its small school containing all grades of scholars from A B C, to algebra. In that year, by a vote of the people, these districts were united, and with A. B. Campbell, Geo. Churchill and J. H. Knapp, as directors, the scholars were graded and a beginning was made of the present system of Public Schools. The school buildings were entirely inadequate for the wants, but not until 1866 was anything done to meet the demand. During this year the High School building was erected and finished throughout in the best manner at a cost of \$60,000. J. B. Roberts, who had been superintendent for several years, took possession of this new building, and with a corps of ten faithful assistants, soon placed the school in good running order.

In 1869 the Board of Education erected a school house in the fourth

ward, costing about \$11,000, and furnishing good accommodations for about 250 scholars. The other ward school houses are small, uncomfortable, incommodious, and not half large enough to seat the children of the respective wards. The present Board of Education is determined to remedy this defect as rapidly as possible by the erection of suitable houses in each ward.

The whole number of scholars for the year ending in June 1870, was 2102, being about two fifths of the number legally entitled to the use of the public schools.

The Fire Department.

Galesburg may well claim the honor of being the one of the very few populous inland cities that has a creditable volunteer Fire Department. There are no salaries, no fireman's fund, no municipal appropriation, no subsidies, save the various machines and their appliances, the members as a general thing securing their own fund and procuring their own uniforms. Not that the city authorities decline or refuse aid, but because of the disposition on the part of organizations to maintain themselves. This does not detract in the least from the efficiency of the

department, but rather adds to that strength which always accompanies self-reliance.

Mr. D. C. Brown, the popular foreman in the shops of the Frost Manufacturing Co., is chief engineer, and Mr. Chas. E. Baldwin, the druggist, assistant. Mr. Brown, a young man of great activity and energy, is one of the oldest firemen in the city; and to his individual exertions, continued for years, the department owes much for its present efficiency. Mr. Baldwin is an active fireman, with extensive experience at the east, and as assistant to the chief engineer, is now in his first year. A majority of the members of the different companies are old in the service, are well officered, and still maintain a regular system of drill and practice. There are five companies, two engine, two hose and one hook and ladder.

TORNADO ENGINE COMPANY was organized fifteen years ago, and has sixty members. The company and the apparatus, have acquired an enviable reputation throughout the State, having been victorious in many friendly contests with companies in the principal cities of Illinois, bringing home "The Broom" in nearly every instance.

STEWART HOUSE, which is housed with Tornado, and really a part of the organization, was organized 13 years ago and numbers 16 members. It is a valuable auxiliary, and shares in Tornado's laurels.

ERICSON ENGINE COMPANY was organized six years ago, and has 60 members. Its members are mostly Swedes, whose long residence in the city and country, have made them Americans to all intents and purposes, and as valuable citizens they are highly esteemed. As firemen they keep their rivals constantly nerved up to the highest exertion, and the continual contest for superiority, puts both to the severest test of strength both of machines and men.

GOOD WILL HOSE, is also six years old, and is composed of 16 members. It is Ericson's help-meet, and keeps "Stewart" gallantly on her good behavior. Trials of speed and efficiency are frequent between the two hose companies, and the best judges are not decided as to which is entitled to the palm.

RESCUE HOOK AND LADDER is but two years old, and as a much needed auxiliary has rendered valuable service. The honor of having originated the idea and brought it to a successful conclusion in Galesburg, lies between Mr. Stephen R. Smith, Mr. Chas. E. Baldwin and A. C. Macy, jr., the gentlemen all being active members at the present time. It cost \$1,200, and was paid for by voluntary subscriptions from members and citizens. The city has just erected a handsome building for its accommodation. The buildings occupied by the other companies, are not in keeping, either with the growth of the city or the reasonable demands of the services rendered by these brave volunteers. We hope by the time of our next visit that a Steamer

will have been added to the department, and a regular pay system adopted.

From the time of first covering the evacuation with earth, during the entire process of storing, handling and removal, it remains entirely without odor. In addition to this, there is no waste of fertilizing material and no possibility of infection, even in cholera. The dry earth system, offers to all in town and country every benefit of the water closet; the commode to which it is applied, being portable, can be moved to the bedside in the sick room. There is no leakage or expense for repairs. In it the apparatus and earth reservoir are self contained. A movable metallic pail takes the place of the vault. The pail is emptied as often as necessary—the contents applied to garden or field, or left in a heap under cover—it is inodorous and dries rapidly. The commode can stand in any convenient place in or out doors. The fixtures comprising all the mechanical apparatus by which the dry earth system is applied, can be erected either in doors as a fixed closet, or out doors as a privy. It is chiefly important: 1st. That the earth be free from sand or gravel. 2nd. That it be dried (and this may be done in the sun). 3d. That it be sifted (at least through a coal-sifter). 4th. That the bottom of the vessel be first covered with earth to prevent adhesion; and 5th. That enough earth (a pint or more) be thrown on the deposit to entirely cover it. This is all. The deposits may accumulate in the house for a whole year, or they may be removed daily, as circumstances suggest. They will at no time be more offensive than so much earth from the garden.

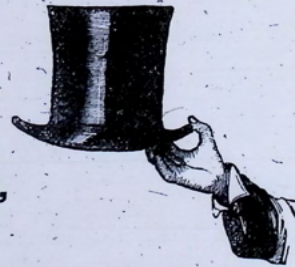

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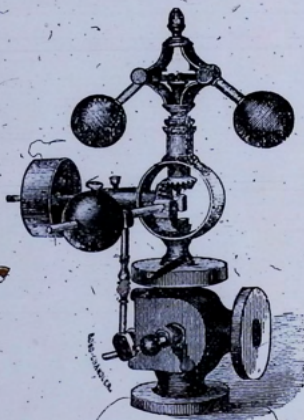

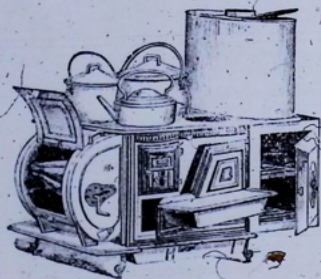

Earth Closets!



Commodes, Closets, Privy Fixtures

THE EARTH CLOSET is the modern improvement which takes the place of and surpercedes the *Water Closet* in the house, and dispenses with the cesspool and other repulsive features of the *Outdoor Privy*. It entirely dispenses with the use of *water*, employing *dry earth* in its stead. It enables nature's wants to be attended to in comfort instead of with the usual disgusting surroundings. In one of its forms the Earth Closet appears as a *fixture*, in the other it is *movable*. When sold as a fixture, it comprises the needful mechanical apparatus, boxed for shipping, which may be fixed permanently either in the *house* in the same manner as a *water closet*, or attached to the out-door *privy*. It can thus be arranged to have the Earth reservoirs of supply and deposit made sufficiently large to hold enough *earth* to last a year or even longer. When made *movable*, it assumes the form of the "Commode" which is a handsome piece of furniture for the chamber, resembling a chair, that can be easily moved from room to room in case of sickness. HEALTH.—The use of Dry Earth abolishes the necessity for Water Closets, Cesspools and Privy Sewers, whose contents infect the air, and are carried beneath the ground into our wells, poisoning the very water we drink. It should be remembered that typhoid fever, dysentery and cholera infection are due mainly to these causes. Any kind of earth, clay and garden soil, free from sand or gravel, may be used with equal good effect, when applied dry and pulverized.
