HISTORICAL AND BUSINESS REVIEW.

ITS PROGRESS AND PROSPECTS.

Galesburg, the county seat of Knox county, is one of the most delightfully located and laid out of any of our inland cities. It is located on the height of the water-shed between the Mississippi and Illinois Rivers, on the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad, where the Burlington & Peoria, and other branches leave the main trunk line, and is about 163 miles south-southwest from Chicago. Its early history dates back some *thirty-seven* years, through the whole of which time it has steadily increased in wealth and population, and now numbers, according to the most reliable data, nearly *thirteen thousand* souls. In 1836, through the influence of Rev. Dr. Geo. W. Gale, a tract of land containing eleven thousand acres was purchased in Knox county. A site for the town was laid out in the center of this tract, and the lots and farms so appraised as to repay the original cost, and leave a surplus of about *Forty Thousand Dollars*, which was to form, and be used as an endowment for a college. With such a prospect, it was no matter of surprise that the infant City of Galesburg made rapid strides of progress, from the outset. About this time a spirit of speculation was rife, and the mania grew upon almost all classes of people, from the richest to the poorest, until many were drawn into the maelstrom of ruin. When the shock had passed, however, those towns whose foundations were entirely speculation, almost or quite ceased to exist save upon paper, or in the imaginative minds of a few hopeful speculators. But not so with Galesburg; for with "educational advantages" as its corner stone, it survived the crisis, and steadily prospered.

The early history of the town is also that of Knox College, as the foundation of one gave rise to the other. As early as 1837, the first buildings were

erected and the college opened, and for many years nothing of importance occurred to disturb the even tenor of its prosperity. It was also in 1837 that the first store was built in Galesburg, and for those early days was considered one of the finest buildings in the West. It was erected by Chauncey S. Colton, and is that now owned by his son, John B. Colton, and conducted as a dry goods and clothing establishment, cor. W. Main street and public square.

In 1850 a great tidal wave of railway enterprise and speculation swept over this section, which made the future of the city no longer problematical as it infused new life and vigor into every kind of transaction.

Real estate in and near the town rapidly increased in value, and Knox College experienced its endowment increase from forty thousand dollars to over a *Quarter of a Million*. In the year 1851, still mindful of its literary birth, the friends of liberal education established Lombard University here, under the auspices of the Universalist denomination. The land donated for its site was valued at *twenty thousand dollars*, and the institution was "named" after its liberal and large-hearted donor, Benjamin Lombard, Sr., of Chicago.

In 1857 the City of Galesburg was incorporated, and elected for its first Mayor, H. R. Sanderson, a gentleman highly regarded, and who, at this writing, is serving as Alderman of the First Ward, and is President of the Galesburg Driving Park and Agricultural Fair Grounds Association. The streets of the city are laid out at right angles, are well provided with sidewalks, and afford many attractive promenades and drives, all of which are taken advantage of probably more than in any other city of its size, as almost everybody in Galesburg own their own fashionable turnouts. The principal business street of the city is Main street, which at almost all hours is as busy as many of the busy streets of Chicago. Upon either side of this street are some elegant and massive structures. One of the crowning glories of Galesburg is the profusion of shrubbery, everywhere in abundance. Lining the streets, and around all the residences, forest and ornamental trees appear to vie with each other in giving a homelike appearance, and in spring and summer there is such a wilderness of foliage as to make it in reality an earthly paradise, and almost to obscure the houses. While the city is well supplied with colleges, she lacks nothing in the way of public schools. Each of the Ward schools are elegant brick structures, while the High School is a magnificent brick edifice, erected at a cost of *Sixty Thousand Dollars*.

The principal streets and business houses of the city are lighted with gas, a very good quality being manufactured at the works of the "Galesburg Gaslight & Coke Company," from a superior quality of coal which abounds in this section. We said at the commencement of this notice that Galesburg

was the county-seat of Knox county. This is of so recent date, that we would say, by way of explanation, that for 12 to 15 years past a local war has waged between Galesburg and Knoxville, a small town some five miles distant, and formerly the seat of government of Knox county. Galesburg being the largest city in the county, as well as the business and political centre, naturally claimed the county-seat. Large sums of money were contributed as a fund to carry on this war, and the bitter feelings engendered entered into business, social, and political relations, separating friends, and even dividing families. Happily a general election put an end to open hostilities, and the public voice decided in favor of Galesburg, by a significant majority. Knoxville, unwilling to give up the prize, appealed to the Supreme Court of the State, which finally affirmed the decision of the people, and declared it to be the county-seat of Knox county. The city authorities thereupon tendered the magnificent Opera House as a Court House, until suitable buildings could be provided. The offer was accepted by the Board of Supervisors, and the next term of court was held in the spacious auditorium of the Opera House, in February, 1873. The first notable case tried in the "New Court House," was "The People against John Marion Osborne," charged with the murder of Mrs. Adelia M. Matthews, near Yates City, in 1872. He was convicted and executed at Knoxville, March 13th, 1873. The excitement during the progress of the trial was intense, pervading all classes of the community, some 5,000 strangers from all parts of the county remaining day after day, until the close. The case was made famous by a pamphlet entitled "Murdered Wives," written by Mr. Stephen R. Smith, who had been appointed official reporter of the court.

Knoxville then set petitions afloat demanding a new election, as provided by the New Constitution. When the question of the erection of a new Court House and Jail was broached by Galesburg, Knoxville caused an injunction to be served on the Board of Supervisors, which is pending the new election, to take place in November, 1873. As is always the case, both sides are confident of victory; but having commenced Galesburg as the county-seat of Knox county, we feel safe in putting this history to press without altering or changing a single line.

The Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad is very important to this city. There over 400 miles in the different roads centering at this point, besides many miles more which it is hoped will soon be realized, connecting Galesburg with Rock Island, and other important points in that region of country. The Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad at present owns all the roads connected with this city. Their real estate and personal property within the city is estimated to be worth about \$400,000. The business of the roads at this point, in the various departments, is about \$100,000 per annum. The shops of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad here, are

of great importance to the city, being very extensive, and giving employment to some 400 men, besides from 150 to 200 on the trains. The stock of the road as well as the track is among the best in the United States, while the officers and other officials are noted for their efficiency, and courtesy to the public.

The stock-yards for the "accommodation of man and beast" comprise a new C. B. & Q. institution. They are located on ample grounds, in the western portion of the city, in close proximity to the site of the proposed new depot, communicating with the main lines of the road by means of many side-tracks. The object is to afford rest and refreshment to stock *en route* to market, and every convenience which necessity demands, and which means and enterprise could secure, are supplied in generous abundance.

Mr. Seacord is the Superintendent in charge, giving his whole time and attention to his rude guests. This devotion is the more commendable since mine host is assured that few will ever live to come again. Mr. S. was formerly Sheriff of Knox county, and is a gentleman of sterling integrity and great force of character. The management of the C. B. & Q. have in contemplation the erection of a new and commodious depot building at the head of Broad street, in the southwestern portion of the city, which may have a tendency to make that thoroughfare one of the principal streets. A company has also been organized, under a charter for a street railway, with John B. Colton as President, which will be laid on Broad street, leading from the new depot to *Belden's Union Hotel*, and other places. There has been great activity in all classes of buildings since the last issue of our Directory. Magnificent residences and business houses and blocks have been erected, which would do honor to a city the size of Chicago. The *Opera House* is an elegant and massive structure, and has a capacity for comfortably seating 1800 persons. It is well finished and equipped with everything necessary for such an institution. It was built nearly three years ago by several enterprising gentlemen of the city, Mr. Chas. Brechwald being the general agent and controlling owner.

"Metropolitan Block," destroyed by fire since our last publication, has been replaced by a new and elegant structure which approaches completion as these pages go to press. It is situated on the old site and will be occupied by prominent business firms, representing different branches of trade. The corner of Main and Cherry streets, "McMillen's corner," is already occupied by that enterprising and unsurpassed artist; while No. 10 represents George Murdoch's dry goods headquarters; No. 8 Grose & Styer's mammoth book and stationery establishment; and No. 6 Davidson & Rhodes' new boot and shoe palace.

The Union Hotel and Block have also been re-erected and is a massive and elegant block. The first floors are used as stores and offices, including the popular Farmers' and Mechanics' Bank. The hotel is, as before, kept

by "Hi" Belden, a gentleman who has had 16 years' hotel experience in Galesburg, and one of the most popular landlords in the West.

The Brown's Hotel is also a beautiful building and does honor to its principal founder, George W. Brown, of corn planter fame.

Knox College

was founded in 1837, fully organized as a college in 1841, and had its origin in a plan of Christian benevolence. Half the township of land now known as Galesburg, was originally purchased by a company formed at Whitesboro, New York, by Rev. George W. Gale, as an endowment for the College. The land was purchased at the Government price, and repurchased of the company by its individual members at an average of \$5.00 per acre. The land remaining unsold and the cash proceeds constituted the endowment of the College. Nearly 400 acres of this land situated near the heart of the city, remain unsold. The College has never yet been rich in money, but has substantial and commodious buildings, real estate and other property which is increasing in value and will in future years be an ample endowment. The College is under a Board of Trustees, representing various evangelical churches and has adopted a well defined policy, which will be steadily pursued till it shall reach the position among the leading Colleges of the country to which its origin and resources entitle it. The College proper is modeled upon the plan of the American College, intended to be in the highest degree practical, not in the sense that it will fit its students for any particular calling, but in the sense that it will impart that culture and knowledge which are so essential as a basis of the highest success in all callings. For this purpose the study of Latin, Greek and mathematics are specially employed. With these two modern languages, together with the Natural sciences, and the various studies of Philosophy, Logic, Rhetoric, General History and Literature, are united. In this institution the College is the object of chief solicitude and care as it gives its character to the many schools about it. The scientific school is connected with the College proper, its course being selected from the studies of the regular College curriculum, excluding the ancient languages and including the modern languages, mathematics and the Natural sciences.

The Female Seminary.

Parallel with the College course is the collegiate course of the Seminary extending over four years. This course is pursued under the instruction both of the special Seminary Faculty and the College Faculty in a separate building, and usually in separate classes.

Lombard University.

Lombard University has its origin in the deep religious convictions and zeal of persons, who felt the need of an institution of sound and varied

learning, in which the best training of the intellect and the affections should be secured, while the minds of pupils should be left untrammelled by narrow sectarian dogmas. It has been sustained as a liberal, christian school, and while seeking in all its departments to give appropriate instruction and needed discipline, it has endeavored also, to exert a highly moral and truly religious influence.

It was chartered under the name of the "Illinois Liberal Institute," February 15th, 1851. It was opened for instruction August 29th, 1852. It became a College by charter amendment, January 26th, 1853. The Institute building was burned September 27th, 1855. The present University building, a gothic edifice, three stories high, 80 feet long and 66 feet wide, was erected in 1856, in honor of Benjamin Lombard, who had made a large donation to the institution, it was by the amendment of its charter, approved February 14th, 1857, named Lombard University.

It is accessible by railroad from all parts of the West, being situated near the junction of roads leading to Chicago, Burlington, Quincy, Peoria and Rushville.

It is the purpose of Lombard University to afford to students of either sex equal opportunities for thorough courses of instruction; and the studies pursued have been arranged:

First, To provide a full collegiate course of four years, such as is usually pursued in the best Colleges and Universities in this country.

Second, To accommodate those, to whose circumstances it may be specially adapted, with a Scientific course, of the same length and so arranged as to combine with practical knowledge, intellectual culture and discipline.

Third, To provide a Literary course for those who do not desire to pursue the regular Classical or Scientific course of the Institution. It also occupies a period of four years.

Fourth, To afford a thorough preparation for each of the collegiate courses.

Fifth, To meet the wants of those who are unable to pursue either of the regular courses of the Institution.

It embraces at this time two departments of Instruction—the Collegiate and Preparatory.

The Collegiate includes three courses of instruction of four years each; a full Classical course, such as is usually pursued in the best Colleges of this country; a Scientific course; and a Literary course including more study of Languages and less Mathematics than the Scientific course.

The Preparatory department, under the supervision of a good disciplinarian and teacher, includes the studies required to enter the different courses of the Collegiate department, and, in view of a preparation for business and teaching, the various other branches usually taught in Academies and High schools.

Normal classes are formed every term for the benefit of teachers. Instruction is given in the Fall term in Civil engineering, and good opportunities are offered to those wishing to obtain a practical knowledge of this subject.

Those who are not candidates for a Degree may receive instruction in any class which they can profitably enter. Music and other ornamental branches will receive prominent attention.

Students of either sex, of approved character and qualifications, may be admitted to any department of instruction, or to any class connected with Lombard University.

The requisitions for admission to the Preparatory department are, an ability to read correctly and fluently, a knowledge of the elements of Geography, and of four of the fundamental rules of Arithmetic.

The Degree of Bachelor of Science is conferred upon those who complete the studies of the Scientific course.

The Degree of Laureate of Arts is conferred upon those who complete the Literary course.

Those completing the Classical course receive the Degree of Bachelor of Arts.

The Degree of Master of Arts is conferred, in course, upon every Bachelor of Arts of three years' standing, who may have sustained in the meantime, a good moral character.

Public Schools.

The school system of this city is modeled substantially after that of Chicago. There are ten grades and the high school, which includes a course of three years.

The graded system was organized in the year 1861.

The first substantial building was erected in the year 1866 in the central part of the city at a cost of nearly \$60,000. This building will accommodate about 650 pupils. There are two first-class Ward school buildings accommodating 300 pupils each, one in the Fourth and one in the Fifth Ward.

There is also accommodation for about 600 more pupils in the various Ward buildings in different parts of the city.

During the school year ending June 1863 there were 1264 pupils enrolled in all the public schools, and for the year ending June 1873 the number was 2,224.

The whole number of persons of school age (between 6 and 21), according to the last census is 3,572. The number of pupils belonging to the high school is 67.

During the past two years an evening school has been maintained during the winter months. The average attendance has been about 60.

There are 1,400 boxes in this office, and the proceeds turned over to the general Government, after deducting all expenses, amount to over \$10,000 per annum. Money order business foots over \$100,000 per annum, proving that it is one of the leading *first-class* offices.

Fire Department.

The safety and protection from fire, of our homes and other property, is one of the *first* considerations of importance in the selection of a residence or business location. So far as the city of Galesburg goes in this direction, she need not fear much from the fire fiend, as most of her business houses are solid brick structures, while many of them are fire proof. But notwithstanding this fact, she, with her usual caution, has secured a very creditable fire department, to combat any emergency that may arise. At the present writing the city authorities are contemplating the purchase of a couple of excellent steam fire engines, in order to make the property of the city doubly secure. The organization is, however, at the present time superior in muscle, discipline, and engines and their various appliances, to most other Western cities, and will bear favorable comparison with that of any other in the West. The department owes much of its high state of efficiency to

the untiring efforts and labors of D. C. Brown, who, until recently, held for several years the position of Chief Fire Marshal. The present Chief is H. W. Goldsmith, who is an old fireman, and a gentleman of great endurance while his First Assistant, J. F. Raymer, is a worthy and old fireman. There are two Engine Companies, three Hose Companies, one Hook and Ladder Company, and the excellent steam pump company of Geo. W. Brown's corn planter works. Each of the Engines are kept in good repair, while the Hook and Ladder truck, which was manufactured at the carriage manufactory of J. F. Raymer & Co., at a cost of \$1,200, is said to eclipse any other in this section. In the matter of furnishing the city with better facilities in the extinguishing of fires, Geo. W. Brown has shown his liberality and enterprise to its usual extent, and has furnished a steam pump to which hose can be carried to any business point in the city, and which is constantly in readiness, night or day. Altogether the fire department numbers about 175 members, most of whom are experienced and efficient firemen, and who show considerable nerve and endurance whenever called upon by their Chief to "put out" a fire. The majority of them are old in the service, and have won admiration from many of our citizens for their faithfulness and efficient labors.

Young Men's Library Association.

Cities are usually judged by the facilities offered in the way of education, and we may truly say, few cities, if any, the size of Galesburg, offers equal advantages in this line.

Among these advantages may be named the above association which was organized and chartered some twelve or fifteen years ago, since when its influence for good has been largely felt in the city. It was first commenced by voluntary contributions from some of our leading citizens, amounting to a few hundred volumes. To these, however, have been added from year to year, mostly by purchases, until now the library contains between 4,000 and 5,000 volumes: consisting of scientific works, biographies, histories, works of fiction, and all the publications of the day that the managers consider of general interest. On the whole, this is one of the best libraries in this part of the State, and Galesburg may well feel proud of it, and her citizens take the active interest they do in its success. It is located over 25 E. Main street, and is open Tuesday and Thursday evenings of each week, as well as Saturday afternoons. Officers: Hon. A. Kitchell, president; H. M. Hale, vice-president; J. M. Galesburg Driving Park and Agricultural Association.

Galesburg is highly favored in the number of public spirited and enterprising gentlemen she claims as citizens, that no matter what tends to advance the interests of the city, this characteristic is fully borne out in their actions, but notably in the formation of the above society. It had long been considered that Galesburg was fortunately situated for an organization of this kind, and the following named officers a few months ago set about the work, and through their energy and well known public spirited actions, together with liberal subscriptions and the assistance of numerous citizens, have secured and laid out the finest grounds for this purpose in this section of country. The grounds contain *sixty* acres, and are beautifully located within easy distance of all places of business, only being nine blocks north-east of the public square and Belden's **Union Hotel**. They are well shaded with a natural growth of trees on the east side, and supplied with an abundance of good water. One hundred and fifty box stalls for horses, twelve feet square, with spacious and elegant amphitheatre, floral hall, and other buildings, are already erected, and ample accommodations for all other classes of stock and implements. A good semicircle mile track is also completed, which is said to be the finest in this part of the State. 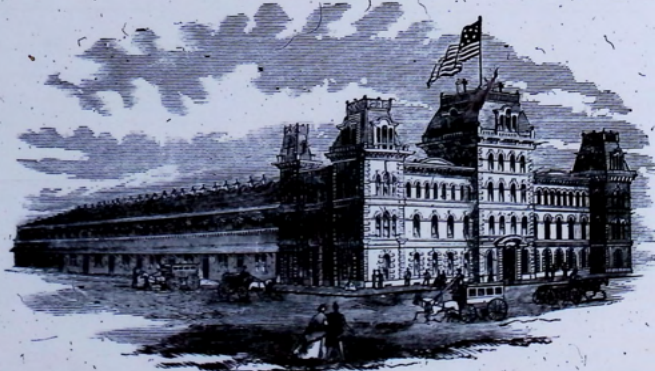

GENERAL EDITORIAL REVIEW,

EMBRACING

Manufacturers, Professional Men, and Prominent Business Houses In the City of Galesburg, Ill.

Before commencing our notices on the different business houses and firms, we wish it distinctly understood that they are *not paid for in any instance*.
