By the Numbers

GPL librarians track all sorts of statistics, from the number of pages faxed in a year (5,434) to the number of books loaned to other libraries (9,756), and these figures provide a snapshot of how staff use their time and how the community benefits from library services.

These numbers only tell part of the story, though. They don't track the confidence gained by patrons after one-on-one sessions with the Technology and Employment Specialist; they don't capture the pride felt by families meeting the 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten goal; they don't reveal the relationships built among high school students in Teen Advisory Board or the caregivers attending Baby Bounce.

The numbers do show that every day the library is open, an average of 375 people visit, 100 people request information, and 491 items are shared with community members.



What was new in 2023?

Thanks to a grant from the American Heart Association, we added heart-related items to our Library of Things including a CPR & First Aid Kit and a blood pressure monitor, and we started yoga classes for all age groups. We also introduced Tonieboxes and civics flashcards to our circulating collection.

New programs this year included Bilingual Storytime, Baby Bounce, Junior Book Club, Home Ownership Programs, Mindful Meditation, and Dungeons & Dragons meetings for kids and adults, in addition to our standing teen D&D Club. We held our first puzzle swap in May, hosted the Wallace W. Abbey Exhibition in July, and added a self-check station in September.

A partnership with Bridgeway brought the Adult System of Care Coordinator to the library twice a week, making GPL a one-stop-shop for social services, and a partnership with Loving Bottoms Diaper Bank made period supplies available to library patrons.

New Building

Galesburg Public Library will close our current location on March 1 and will reopen in the spring at our new location, 264 West Main Street. Much of 2023 was devoted to meeting with architects and contractors, selecting furniture and finishes, planning our closure and move, and giving building tours. The new building will include five study rooms, a large community room, a skills lab, a tech lab, a large collection, a reading balcony, outdoor reading spaces, and more.

Plans for the new building began nearly two decades ago, and the location on the corner of West Main and South Academy Streets was selected in 2009 under then-Director Pam Van Kirk's leadership. Board members, community members, and the newly founded GPL Foundation advocated for the project for years, and when Harriett Zipfel became director, she completed and submitted the application for the Public Library Construction Act Grant.

In 2021, the library was finally awarded the grant funds for \$15.3 million, and the GPL Foundation officially kicked off the capital campaign, raising \$4 million by the end of 2022. Countless people worked tirelessly into making this dream a reality including current and past staff and board members, Foundation board members, City officials and administrators, volunteers, donors, advocates, Friends of the Library, local and state legislatures, business leaders, committee members, and patrons.
