

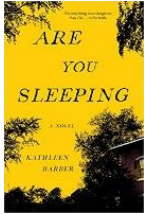
Galesburg Public Library Book Club Kits

If you have a book club kit title to suggest, please speak to a Reference librarian.

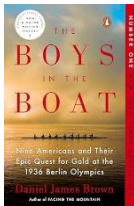
New kits are added regularly. New titles are marked below with →*NEW*

***Are You Sleeping* by Kathleen Barber.** Twisty psychological thriller about a podcast that reopens a murder case—and threatens to unravel the carefully constructed life of the victim's daughter. Author Barber is a Galesburg native. Also an Apple TV+ series called *Truth Be Told*.



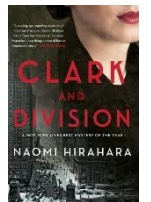
***Becoming* by Michelle Obama.** In a life filled with meaning and accomplishment, Michelle Obama has emerged as one of the most iconic and compelling women of our era. With honesty and wit, she describes her triumphs and her disappointments, both public and private. Related DVD: *Southside With You*.

***The Book Thief* by Markus Zusak.** A foster child in Nazi Germany shares her stolen books with her neighbors, her foster parents, and the Jew hidden in their basement. Related DVD: *The Book Thief*.



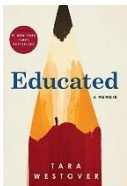
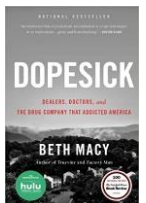
→*NEW* ***The Boys in the Boat* by Daniel James Brown.** The story of the University of Washington's 1936 eight-oar crew and their epic quest for an Olympic gold medal at Hitler's 1936 Berlin Olympics. Related DVD: *The Boys in the Boat*.

***Clark and Division* by Naomi Hirahara.** Set in 1944 Chicago, this eye-opening and poignant mystery tells the story of a young woman searching for the truth about her revered older sister's death and brings to focus the struggles of one Japanese American family released from mass incarceration at Manzanar during World War II. 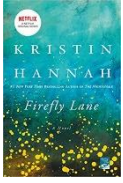


***Daisy Jones and the Six* by Taylor Jenkins Reid.** A gripping novel about the whirlwind rise of an iconic 1970s rock group and their beautiful lead singer, revealing the mystery behind their infamous breakup. Also a TV show in Amazon Prime Video.

***Dopesick* by Beth Macy.** Takes us into the epicenter of a national drama that has unfolded over two decades. The spread of opioid addiction follows a tortuous trajectory that illustrates how this crisis has persisted for so long and become so firmly entrenched. Also a Hulu mini-series.

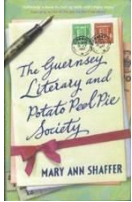


***Educated* by Tara Westover.** Traces the author's experiences as a child born to survivalists in the Idaho mountains, her family's paranoid stockpiling activities, and her resolve to educate herself well enough to earn acceptance into a prestigious university and the unfamiliar world beyond.



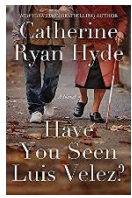
Firefly Lane by Kristin Hannah. Spanning more than three decades and playing out across the ever-changing face of the Pacific Northwest, *Firefly Lane* is the poignant, powerful story of two women and the friendship that becomes the bulkhead of their lives. Also a Netflix series.

Good Omens by Neil Gaiman and Terry Pratchett. A comic novel featuring an angel and a demon who've grown comfortable on earth and try to stop the coming apocalypse. Related DVD: *Good Omens* Amazon mini-series starring David Tennant and Michael Sheen.



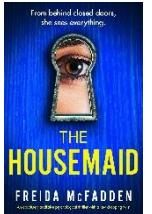
The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Society by Mary Ann Shaffer. Juliet Ashton receives a letter from a stranger, a member of the Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society. So begins a remarkable tale of Guernsey during the German occupation. Also a Netflix movie.

The Hate U Give by Angie Thomas. Teen Starr Carter moves between two worlds: the poor neighborhood where she lives and the fancy suburban prep school she attends. The uneasy balance between these worlds is shattered when Starr witnesses the fatal shooting of her childhood best friend Khalil at the hands of a police officer. Related DVD: *The Hate U Give*.



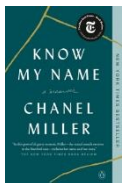
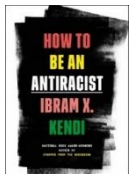
→*NEW* **Have You Seen Luis Velez? by Catherine Ryan Hyde.** Raymond Jaffe feels like he doesn't belong anywhere. After his best friend moves away, Raymond has only two real connections: to the feral cat he's tamed and a blind ninety-two-year-old woman in his building who asks him to help her find her missing caretaker Luis.

→*NEW* **Housemaid by Freida McFadden.** A family's maid cleans their house, covets their lifestyle...and keeps a secret.



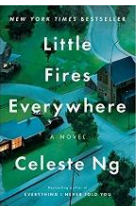
→*NEW* **The House of Eve by Sadeqa Johnson.** In 1950s Philadelphia, 15-year-old Ruby Pearsall is on track to becoming the first in her family to attend college, in spite of having a mother more interested in keeping a man than raising a daughter. But a taboo love affair threatens to pull her back down into the poverty and desperation that has been passed on to her like a birthright.

How to Be an Antiracist by Ibram X. Kendi. Combines ethics, history, law, and science with a personal narrative to describe how to move beyond the awareness of racism and contribute to making society just and equitable.



→*NEW* **Know My Name by Chanel Miller.** Brock Turner was sentenced to just six months in county jail after he was found sexually assaulting a young woman on Stanford's campus. Her victim impact statement, posted on BuzzFeed, instantly went viral. Chanel Miller reclaims her identity to tell her story of trauma, transcendence, and the power of words.

Little Fires Everywhere by Celeste Ng. A riveting story that traces the intertwined fates of the picture-perfect Richardson family and the enigmatic mother and daughter who upend their lives. Also a Hulu mini-series.



Little Heathens by Mildred Armstrong Kalish. One woman's memories of growing up in Iowa during the Great Depression. Related DVD: *The People in the Pictures: Stories from the Wettach Farm Photos.*

A Long Way from Chicago by Richard Peck. Warm, humorous fiction about two young siblings from Chicago spending summers from 1929-1942 with their unforgettable grandmother in central Illinois. Author Peck grew up in Decatur, Illinois.

Lucky by Marissa Stapley. Lucky Armstrong is a tough grifter who has just pulled off a million-dollar heist with her boyfriend. She's ready to start a brand-new life, with a new identity, when things go sideways. A Reese Witherspoon Book Club Pick, *Lucky* has also been optioned for a TV series.

Major Pettigrew's Last Stand by Helen Simonson. Major Ernest Pettigrew, honor-bound Englishman and widower, falls for Mrs. Jasmina Ali, the Pakistani shopkeeper in their village.

Me Before You by Jojo Moyes. A girl with an ordinary life is hired as the caretaker for a thrill-seeking former executive now paralyzed after an accident. Related DVD: *Me Before You.*

My Lovely by local author LeAnn Morgan. Poppy Townsend heads south on the Mississippi to find out why her estranged grandfather has summoned her. Poppy meets his boarders, including the handsome and mysterious Jack Stoneking, while searching for answers to the scandalous rumor about her father and to the sudden disappearance of her mother.

Redeeming Love by Francine Rivers. California's gold country, 1850. A time when men sold their souls for a bag of gold and women sold their bodies for a place to sleep. Angel expects nothing from men but betrayal. Sold into prostitution as a child, she survives by keeping her hatred alive. Then she meets Michael, a man who seeks his Father's heart in everything. Related DVD: *Redeeming Love.*

Rising Strong by Brené Brown. Social scientist Brown has ignited a global conversation on courage, vulnerability, and worthiness. Her pioneering work uncovered a profound truth: the willingness to show up and be seen with no guarantee of outcome is the only path to more love and belonging. But we are, inevitably, going to stumble and fall. It is the rise from falling that Brown takes as her subject. Sharp Objects by Gillian Flynn. A second-rate reporter for a fourth-rate newspaper returns to her hometown in search of a breakout story about a murderer targeting young girls in gruesome fashion. Related DVD: *Sharp Objects* HBO mini-series.

Snake Woman of Little Egypt by former Knox College professor Robert Hellenga. In this novel brimming with wit, substance, and emotional depth, a middle-aged anthropology professor contemplating his future becomes romantically involved with a woman released from jail after shooting her husband, the pastor of a snake-handling church.
